

## MARKET ADVISORS OF OREGON NAMED

Board Will Aid New State Farm Director, to Be Appointed Later.

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 8.—(AP)—Willard L. Marks, president of the state board of higher education, has announced the personnel of the advisory committee for the new division of agricultural and industrial marketing.

The committee, nominated by Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter, President G. W. Peavy of Oregon State college, and President Donald M. Erb of the University of Oregon, and approved by the board, follows:

E. B. McNaughton, Portland, chairman; William A. Schreiner, dean of the school of agriculture of Oregon State college, Corvallis; Victory P. Morris, dean of the school of business administration of the University of Oregon, Eugene; J. D. Mickie, director of the state department of agriculture, Salem; Clarence Bishop, Pendleton; R. L. Clark, Portland; Edward Geary, Klamath Falls; E. A. McCormack, Salem; J. R. Gerber, Portland.

"According to action of the board the function of the advisory committee will be to advise the director in all important matters of policy and procedure," Marks said.

"Major policies, of course, will be submitted to the board of higher education for final action through the regular administrative channels.

"Appointment of a director for the division of agricultural and industrial marketing will proceed as soon as a suitable person with the essential qualifications can be secured," Marks said.

"Nomination for the position will be brought to the board by Chancellor Hunter, President Peavy and President Erb after consulting with the newly appointed advisory committee."

## RUFUS C. HOLMAN NOW TOWNSENDER

PORTLAND, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Rufus C. Holman, republican senatorial standard bearer and present state treasurer, revealed Saturday he had joined the Buckman School Townsend club.

"Only those who have read the authorized literature... can have an intelligent knowledge of the Townsend recovery plan," he said.

"I... can say this for it—there is much misinformation and misunderstanding about it."

Holman, in a prepared statement asserted that any financial plan for recovery based on a pay-as-you-go basis "is to be preferred to any plan financed by endless borrowing," referring to the policy of the Roosevelt administration.

He asserted that every plan proposed for recovery "is experimental," but that a pay-as-you-go plan was automatically regulated and could be amended or repealed as the people desired.

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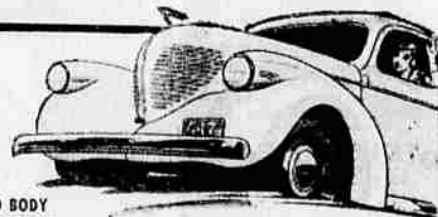
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### CAMAS VALLEY
