HEMORRHAGE FATAL TO CHAS. E. BAIRD

An investigation into the death of Charles Ernest Baird, 36, resident of Reedsport, disclosed that death resulted from cerebral hemorrhage. Coroner H. C. Stearns reported today. Mr. Baird was found dead in his bed Sunday evening, apparently having passed away Saturday night. Cause of death was established by Dr. H. C. Eastland, called into the investigation by Coroner Stearns.

Mr. Baird was born Sept. 18, 1891, in Elkton and had made his home at Reedsport for the past 15 years. He was employed as a pile driver in construction of the south jetty at the mouth of the Umpqua river.

Surviving are his wife; two daughters, Genevieve Lakeview, Oregon, and Elvione of Seattle; two sons, Carl and Hubby, Reedsport, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Baird, Oakland. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Elmer Nickson, Sixes, Oregon, and Mrs. Scott Goodman, Oakland, and four brothers, Earl and Oscar, both of Newport; Elvory, of Sixes, and Donald, of Oakland.

Funeral services will be held at 12:30 p. m. at Reedsport Wednesday.

LECTURE IS DATED AT ELKTON CHURCH

ELKTON, Aug. 9.—A highly praised lecture under the title of "What Is Man?" is to be given in the Elkton Church of Christ at 2:30 Sunday afternoon, August 14, by Rev. G. K. Gilly. YOUTH SLAYS GIRL, BURNS HER CORPSE

PRYOR, Okla., Aug. 8.—(AP)—A murder charge was filed today accusing Wirt Parr, 17-year-old farm youth, of slaying a pretty, honor student, Alma Manning, 19, of Locust Grove and burning her body on a funeral pyre of brush.

The youth told Locust Grove officers to the charred body of Alma Manning, 19, yesterday.

County Attorney Kehn said the youth, in a slanted statement, declared he stopped the girl on a road between their two farm homes and talked to her. When she turned away, Kehn said, the boy apparently became enraged.

"He hit her with a club, knocked her down and then choked her," said Kehn.

"When I knocked her down she looked so pitiful I couldn't attack her. Kehn quoted the youth as saying, 'I dragged her to a brush pile, put her on it and set it afire.'"

PREDICTS LARGER OREGON GOLD YIELD

PORTLAND, Aug. 8.—(AP)—A gold yield of approximately \$3,000,000 in the 1938 prospect in Oregon according to Earl K. Nixon, director of the state department of geology and mineral industries.

This would mean a 59 per cent increase over 1937. Oregon's total mineral production promises to reach \$8,000,000 with slightly more than half the amount to be derived from the various non-metallic substances.

Nixon based his prediction for gold production increase on the brisk activities in the gold mining regions of eastern and southwestern Oregon.

ROSEBURG STUDENT WINS HIGH HONOR

WASHINGTON STATE COLLEGE, Pullman, Aug. 9.—Eleanor Keith of Roseburg has won a place on the Washington State college high scholarship roll for the spring semester. President E. O. Hollis announced today. To be eligible for this honor a student must earn 34 grade points or make a grade average of 90 per cent while carrying a full college course.

Four hundred and fifty-two students, or 12.7 per cent of the enrollment, earned places on the scholarship roll. Fourteen students had "perfect" records with 15 or more hours of "A's."
