## F.R. TALKS TONIGHT ON HEALTH PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Federal health insurance may become one of the President Roosevelt's proposals for broadening the social security program.

The president, who will speak tonight on the third anniversary of the social security act, already has recommended studies looking toward enlarging the program in other respects.

A hint he might mention a health protection system appeared in a statement by Chairman Altmeyer of the social security board.

"The question of health protection," Altmeyer said, "is beginning to appear on the horizon. We may one day set up safeguards against the hazard of illness, paralleling our present lines of defense against the hazards of want during unemployment and of a destitute old age."

The president's brief speech will be broadcast to the nation over all major networks at 6:30 p. m. PST. It will be delivered from the white house.

## HOUSEWIVES ALSO GET JOBSHIP PAY

SALEM, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Housewives are entitled to unemployment compensation benefits if they had sufficient earnings during the year on which benefits are calculated, the unemployment compensation commission said today.

"Complaints that a housewife should not be allowed to draw benefits because her husband is working are voiced without knowledge of law," the commission said in a prepared statement.

"Many claimants have an idea that unemployment insurance is based on need, whereas it is strictly an insurance proposition."

## APPROVE GRANT FOR EDENBOWER SCHOOL

A grant of \$3,726 has been approved by the Public Works Administration for the construction of a new school building in Edenbower, according to word received here today. The district recently voted \$5,000 in bonds to meet its share of the cost. The preliminary plans have been prepared by Tourtellotte and Phillips, Portland architects.

550 warplanes "ready for a war against the U.S.S.R."

JAPANESE ACCUSE SOVIET OF VIOLATING ARMISTICE  
TOKYO, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Domei (Japanese news agency) said today Soviet Russian troops had violated the Changkufeng truce by constructing dugouts within the no-man's-land agreed upon when the border fighting was ended August 11.

The news agency said the Japanese had protested to General Shuren, chief of staff of the far eastern

Red army, and he had promised to enforce observance of the truce, but Soviet troops continued to build dugouts in the 180-yard wide neutral zone separating the Japanese and Russians along the four-mile front.

All Japanese troops had withdrawn the agreed 90 yards from the crest of Changkufeng hill, Domei said.

A war office communique said the main body of the Japanese border force now was concentrated near the southern bank of the Tumen river, where it would remain until evacuation of the Changkufeng area was completed.

BRITISH ACCUSE JAPS OF INSULTING UNION JACK  
SHANGHAI, Aug. 15.—(AP)—New Anglo-Japanese friction arose today as British naval officials accused Japanese of discourtesy to the union jack and molesting a British tugboat captain.

Japanese officials said the incident caused the British to dispatch the gunboat Scorch to investigate the occurrence near Tangchow, at the mouth of the Yangtze river.

The British tugboat Victoria, under charter to a Japanese firm, was said by British naval officials to have been boarded by Japanese navy men, her captain trussed with a rope, and the vessel's union jack lowered unceremoniously.

A Japanese flag was run up in its stead.

The Scorch was believed to be in the vicinity still investigating. A survey of the Yangtze front showed today Japanese gains have been almost negligible since the capture of Kluikang July 26, despite bitter fighting on both sides of the river and heavy aerial bombardments.

CANTON AND CONNECTING RAILWAY LINE BOMBED  
CANTON, China, Aug. 15.—(AP)—A deluge of shrapnel and anti-aircraft shell fragments during a Japanese air raid today caused scores of waterfront refugees to leap into the river opposite the international settlement on Shameen island.

It was believed all were rescued by small boats.

The Japanese attack was directed at the Wongshe section of the city, which had been virtually wrecked in previous bombings and which was almost deserted.

Few casualties were expected. Eighteen additional planes passed over the city and bombed the Canton-Hankow railway to the north.

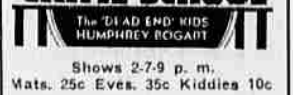
