

ACCIDENTS KILL FIVE NAVY FLIERS

Four Others Injured When Disaster Hits Twice at Maneuvers.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Aug. 15.—(AP)—Disaster struck a live force among the navy's war planes in "routine" maneuvers, leaving five fliers dead and four injured today.

Attempting a landing after dark last night, a patrol bomber smashed nose first into San Diego bay, carrying two of a crew of six to their deaths.

The four survivors, all injured, were pulled from the water as the wreckage sank.

Ten hours earlier, a speedy torpedo plane plunged earthward from an altitude of 3,000 feet over Camp Kerney mesa. Its three crewmen perished in the crash.

Death, here, spared six men in another patrol bomber, which was damaged in a forced landing in the bay last night. The fliers emerged unhurt.

Both bombers, of the type flown successfully on long distance flights to the Hawaiian Islands and Panama, had been practicing night landings in preparation for a 16-plane mass hop to Coco Solo, August 31.

Navy authorities said one of the bomber's dead was H. Brockman, about 23, but identification of the second victim was lacking until later today.

The injured included A. A. Bell, 30, aviation machinist's mate, and R. O. Christinger, both reported in serious condition. Names of the other injured were not made available immediately.

played in Ohio and Arkansas for pro-administration candidates. Some administration advisers, however, are as eager for him to go into Maryland and attack Tydings as directly as he did Sen. Walter F. George in Georgia.

Lewis followed up the president's address with a radio speech of his own to Maryland voters. He criticized Tydings, whom Mr. Roosevelt had not mentioned for merely voting "present" when the senate passed the social security act. In fact, he added, Tydings had voted against 22 "vital" administration measures.

Senator Tydings did not refer to the president's speech when he appeared later in the evening at a democratic rally in Hagerstown, Md., but he predicted the 1940 congress would make substantial revisions in the social security act.

(It was the third anniversary of that law which occasioned the president's address.)

Tydings told the Hagerstown audience:

"The money taken from men and women employees (for old age pension) is equivalent to an income tax on the lowest earning group. There is much to be desired in the social security act."

Would Widen Law

Mr. Roosevelt expressed the hope the next congress would extend and improve the program, now limited to old age pensions and unemployment insurance. He mentioned as possibilities the provision of medical services, liberalization of the old age insurance, and inclusion of additional groups of citizens in the program.

"What we are doing is good," the president said, but it is not good enough.

"These accomplishments of three years are impressive, yet we should not be unduly proud of them. Our government in fulfilling an obvious obligation to the citizens require action from their representatives."

"If the people, during these years, had chosen a reactionary administration or a 'do nothing congress', social security would still be in the congressional stage—a beautiful dream which might come true in the dim distant future."

"To be truly national, a social security program must include all who need its protection. Today many of our citizens are still excluded from old age insurance and unemployment compensation because of the nature of their employment."

Warning Sounded

Although saying he was confident each year would bring further development in federal and state social security legislation, he said he had "one word of warning."

"In our efforts to provide security for all of the American people," he continued, "let us not allow ourselves to be misled by those who advocate short cuts to Utopia or fantastic financial schemes."

Devoing part of his talk to a general discussion of the duties of government, Mr. Roosevelt said:

"The millions of today want, and have a right to, the same security their forefathers sought—the assurance that with health and the willingness to work they will find a place for themselves in the social and economic system of the time."

"We must face the fact that in this country we have a rich man's security and that the government owes equal obligations to both. National security is not a half and half matter; it is all or none."

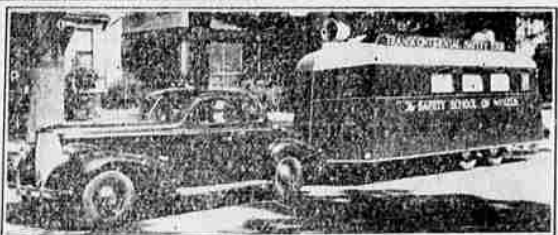

The "Safety School on Wheels," a twenty-five foot custom built trailer, towed by a new eight-cylinder coupe, visited Roseburg yesterday on its transcontinental tour. It is expected that the exhibit will be viewed by more than a quarter million people during the 16,000 mile journey.

Displays included startling posters calling attention to the accident toll and disclosing causes. Normal reaction time, unrestricted vision, the problem of the "drinking driver," and other factors pertaining to the driving of automobiles were among features stressed.

Literature was distributed to all persons viewing the display urging safety in driving.

The tour is sponsored by insurance companies, automobile clubs, W. C. T. U., police officials and others.

suffering under the government's air attacks particularly in the Pando mountains, south of Gaudosa, which insurgent General Franco was reported officially to have cleaned out.

Government militia unleashed a sudden furious counter-attack against the insurgent southern army today and recaptured a railway tunnel on the line leading to Almaden's valuable mercury mines in southwestern Spain.

Government dispatches indicated the insurgent drive had been blocked at least temporarily by the reorganized government force.

MADRID, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Madrid was shaken today by an explosion which government military authorities said was the blast of a powerful mine set off under an insurgent-occupied building in the western university city sector.

A large number of insurgent troops, mostly Moors, was said to have been killed.

Government sources said the insurgents were driven back to their second and third line trenches after a half-hour machine gun and handbomb attack which followed the explosion.

Cholera Toll Drops

For the first time in six weeks weekly health report of the international settlement here showed a decrease in the number of cholera cases to 572 among Chinese and eight among foreigners. There were 242 deaths among Chinese and one among foreigners.

Reports from Szechang said a cholera epidemic was spreading among refugees, leading to fears it might strike among the Chinese and Japanese armies.

Victims Found in Woods

Miss Gross, 23-year-old St. Louis socialite, and Fahey, architect at St. Louis for the national park service, were kidnapped early Saturday as they sat in a parked car at St. Louis. They were driven in Fahey's car to a point near Champlin, Minn., their hands and feet bound with wire and their mouths gagged with handkerchiefs and were tossed into some woods.

A passerby discovered and returned them about 10:30 p. m. Saturday, not long after they were left 100 feet off the road.

Couch was released June 9, 1938, from the Missouri state penitentiary. Meredith, under the name of Otis Sells, was paroled from the state institution several years ago.

Meredith is 21 years old and Couch 23.

Meredith once claimed residence at Kirkwood, Mo., and was employed in Minneapolis at one time as a punch salesman.
