## BELGIUM CONDUCTS WAR MANEUVERS

### Nation Shows No Concern Over German Activity Across Border.

**LONDON, Aug. 17**—(AP)—Little Belgium today opened her biggest scale war maneuvers since 1913 while her massive eastern neighbor throbbed to the drums beats of Adolf Hitler's similar maneuvers closely watched around the world.

Eastern districts of Belgium, which felt the first blow of German invasion 24 years ago, had much the same appearance as in 1914 but the nation's official attitude was one of utter detachment from the German war games.

Meantime, France's air chief, Gen. Joseph Vuillemin, reached Berlin for a friendly tour of German aerial garrisons and aircraft industries.

Reuters (British news agency) dispatches reported the Czechoslovak supreme war council, meeting in Praha, decided the political and military situation of central Europe did not warrant any special military measures to protect the nation from aggression.

Belgium's maneuvers coincided with reports the government had decided to fortify the nation's southern border with concrete machine-gun nests to constitute a third line of defense in case other lines were forced to yield.

Southern defenses also would repel invasion from France.

Observers also pointed out Germany, as a new guarantor of Belgian independence, would not fall to complain if Belgium locked her eastern door and left the southern one open.

## LABOR ROW CLOSES S. F. WAREHOUSES

**SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16**—(AP)—A labor dispute today closed all San Francisco public warehouses.

The 12 companies operating the warehouses closed with the notice to CIO employees they could return to work "if and when you unload the freight cars of supplies from Woolworth."

Spokesmen for the association of San Francisco distributors contended that by refusing to unload the car from the struck Woolworth company shed the union had violated its contract.

Four "five and ten" stores still were being picketed today after a strike was called against the Kress and Newberry concerns in a controversy over renewal of expiring contracts. More than 300 employees were involved.

## LUPE AND JOHNNY FINALLY DIVORCED

**LOS ANGELES, Aug. 17**—(AP)—Lupe Velez finally got that divorce from Johnny Weissmuller.

She went into superior court today and testified her swimmer-husband of five tempestuous years was sullen, jealous and refused to take her out. The hearing was very brief.

This was the third time she sued for divorce. It was announced in court the Mexican actress and her husband had affected a property settlement.

## UPSWING SEEN FOR LUMBER INDUSTRY

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 17**—(AP)—The lumber industry reported today it was "on the upgrade."

For the first time in weeks, its representatives said, the industry was displaying signs of shaking off seasonal doldrums aggravated by abnormal economic conditions of the past winter and spring.

Basing their statements on figures compiled by the National Lumber Manufacturers' association the lumbermen estimated production the past few weeks as 62 per cent of the 1929 weekly average—higher than in many months.
