GRAZING PERMITS SOON TO BE GIVEN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Issuance of long-term grazing permits to western ranchers will be started soon by the government's grazing division in its efforts to manage 120,000,000 acres of public range.

The first permits on a 10-year basis will be issued in Colorado, where the plan will be tested before being extended to some 50 other areas in Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Wyoming and Utah.

F. R. Carpenter, grazing director, said he hoped to bring one district in each state into the program by the end of the year. In each instance, experts are sent into the areas to determine how many head of livestock can be grazed profitably on a given amount of range. In adopting the program congress had the intention of stabilizing the livestock market by limiting the number of head to the carrying capacity of the ranges. Carpenter said the plan, put into effect by the livestock men who voluntarily joined the movement, would eliminate haphazard methods of grazing such as turning animals on to the range without regard to the adequacy of forage.

YOUTH KILLED BY SHOCK FROM MOTOR

MARYSVILLE, Calif., Aug. 16.—(AP)—Donald Witherow, 17, was killed by an electric shock today while using a small electric motor at the dairy farm of his father, H. C. Witherow, near Live Oak. The boy had been a prominent exhibitor at county fairs here and at the state fair in Sacramento. He would have received the state farmer degree of the Future Farmers of America at the state fair this year.

WILLIS PLANT PUTS 1,000 MEN AT WORK

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 17.—Employment of 1,000 men between August 10 and August 15 marked the reopening of the plants of Willis-Overland Motors, Inc., here when production in the body division started after a close down period of several weeks. It was announced by David R. Wilson, president. Initial employment will be only in the machine shop and body department. The assembly line is scheduled to reopen on August 22. Production will be both for domestic and export consumption and follows closely the recent price reduction on Willis passenger cars.

100 CHINESE DROWN WHEN BOATS CRASH

SHANGHAI, Aug. 16.—(AP)—More than 100 Chinese passengers drowned today when the small Chinese coastal steamer Hansa sank after a collision with the British steamer Tungwa off Woosung. The Tungwa reported she picked up only 13 Chinese survivors. The British boat Search sent the message that she had saved the Hansa's German captain after a long struggle in rough water.

The Hansa regularly transported passengers and chickens between Shanghai and Yangtze estuary points. Normally Chinese-owned and operated, she was taken over by Germans at the outbreak of the Chinese-Japanese war.

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MONTANAN BACKS THIRD TERM IDEA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Senator Murray (D-Mont.) pledged his support today to President Roosevelt if the latter seeks a third term, but two other democratic senators expressed doubts that the chief executive would run again.

"I think the president will be guided by the need for continuing his program," Murray said, adding he had found a strong trend in the west for a third term. Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.), on the other hand, characterized third term discussion as "just talk."

"I never favored a third term, and I do not anticipate it now," he said. Senator Minton (D-Ind.), an administration stalwart, said he did not believe the President was considering making the race in 1940. Minton was host last spring at a huge reception generally regarded as launching a presidential boom for Paul V. McNutt, governor general of the Philippines.
