

UTILITY DISTRICT SPONSORS TO MEET

Boundary Lines in Douglas County Project May Be Finished Tonight.

A meeting of representatives of municipalities and rural communities throughout the county, interested in formation of a public power district, will be held at the circuit courtroom in the courthouse tonight. It is expected that work will be completed tonight on proposed district boundary lines, preparatory to starting circulation of petitions asking a survey by the state hydro-electric commission.

Officers of the organization formed to start the utility district movement are particularly anxious to have all municipalities of the county represented at tonight's meeting, according to Fred A. Goff, one of the leaders in the project.

In many counties of the state, Mr. Goff reports, municipalities have taken the initiative in power district organization, but in Douglas county the activity so far has been conducted entirely by the rural communities, with municipalities showing little interest.

Present work, Mr. Goff states, is not binding in any way, and is primarily devoted to fact finding. If a survey shows the proposed project to be too expensive, it can be dropped at any time, while, on the other hand, it is shown that power can be obtained and distributed at reasonable rates, it is to the interest of all parts of the county to participate, Mr. Goff declared.

Chairman Dies (D. Tex.), said the committee would exercise due caution and discretion in its use of the file and Schoemaker said that was all he had in mind.

In obtaining the labor department's Bridge's file, the committee hoped to learn whether any particular influence had delayed deportation of the CIO leader as a communist alien.

Report on Nazis Submitted

The justice department, meanwhile, sent to Dies' committee a voluminous report on activities of the Amerika-Deutscher Volksbund and its affiliated organizations.

The 1,000-page report was made by Director J. Edgar Hoover of the federal bureau of investigation to Attorney General Cummings last December after a five-month investigation of German-American activities in this country.

The Volksbund which is commonly known as the German-American band, maintains training camps throughout the country where German sympathizers meet.

Contents of the report were not made public.

"Prisoners" Abroad

Abraham Sobel, 23, of Boston, who saw service in the Spanish civil war, told the house committee between 1,600 and 1,700 American boys were "virtual prisoners" in armies in that country.

"If those boys were allowed to return to the United States, would they come back?" Chairman Dies asked.

"Every one of them," Sobel replied.

"Are they prisoners over there?"

"Virtually prisoners," Sobel, a law student, told how communists approved the list of Americans who went to Spain to serve the loyalist cause. He also related how he had to salute the Spanish flag and demonstrated the communist salute.

Chairman Dies (D. Tex.), read into the record a letter the witness had written from Paris, telling his family of his experiences, in which Sobel said he had had "some very foolish ideas about
