CHALLENGES POUR IN ON ARMSTRONG

Triple Title Holder, Tired From 2 Years' Battling, Plans Long Rest.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—(AP)—While Henry Armstrong started his first real rest since he left St. Louis in a box car to earn his bread with his fists, challenges flew thick and fast around the little man who is featherweight, lightweight and welterweight champion of the world.

He won his third title from Lon Ambers Wednesday night but some of the magic surrounding his name vanished. His profession saw him at the finish the new lightweight champion, but bleeding, groggy and exhausted—and took heart.

"They all want to fight him now, Ambers most of all. He is an ex-lightweight champion today but he was never more due as a courageous and skillful workman, a fighter who took the heaviest blows of Henry the Hammer and was still around at the finish, banging at Henry and dancing away on legs that ever grew weary."

Without detracting from Lou's heart-warming showing, it might be noted he fought a tired, listless Armstrong. Henry is very stale. He has fought almost continuously for two years and the battles have sapped his magnificent vitality.

"Sure I'd like to fight Lou again," said Henry very bitterly. "But I think I have a rest coming. Besides, the doctor tells me it will take at least three months for this cut in my lip to heal."

WATER DISTRICT RULING IS GIVEN

Commissioners of a water district must call an election within their own territory to determine whether additional territory shall be annexed, Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle held today for District Attorney J. V. Long of Douglas county. The question was submitted on behalf of the Roberts creek water district, which is asked to call an election on the matter of issuing bonds to be used with PWA funds in supplying water for domestic services in the Glenary, Green and Winston territory.

Applications have been made to include a part of Happy valley and the question was raised whether the election inside the district should be called by the county court or by the district commissioners. According to the opinion received from the attorney general, the commissioners will call the election inside the district, while the county court will arrange for the vote in the territory proposed for annexation.

AILING ARM PUTS HUBBELL ON SHELF

N. Y. Giants' Flag Chances Weakened; Yanks Boost Lead to 9 Games.

Carl Hubbell joined Lefty Grove on the sore arm list today, and the New York Giants' pennant stock, like that of the Boston Red Sox before it, hit the skids in a neat nose-dive.

Hubbell, clubbed by the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5-3, yesterday, came up with an ailing pitching arm that may necessitate an operation. It will definitely keep him on the sidelines for at least a week or two, and may prevent him from taking his place on the firing line the rest of the year.

Here are the two greatest left-handers of their day—probably the most feared pitching pair in the game in the last six or eight years—and both shelved in the same month. Grove's arm went "dead," and now the Hub has a painful elbow trouble. A chipped bone may be revealed when X-rays are taken of Hubbell's elbow next week.

Fortunately for Terry's terriers, their setback yesterday didn't send them further in the hole, for the Pirates absorbed a 5-1 routing at the hands of the St. Louis Cardinals and Weiland's four-hit flinging.

Yankees Go Higher.
The Yankees, despite a double header split with Washington, saw their American league lead stretched to nine full games when the second place Cleveland Indians planned back, 4-1, by the St. Louis Browns. Wes Ferrell, making his Yankee debut, outlasted his ex-mates for a 6-5 win in the 11th inning. Kelley tossed a six-hitter for a 6-3 decision for the Nats in the nightcap.

Throughout the big league program, good pitching abounded. Newsom's three-hitter featured the Browns' win over the Indians, enabling the Browns to climb into a seventh-place tie. Haggy turned in a three-hitter and the Red Sox whitewashed the Athletics, 9-0. Derringer allowed seven hits, chipped in a homer himself, and the Cincinnati Reds ripped the Cubs, 9-1. Gill's eight-hit effort gave the Tigers a 5-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox.
