PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT is going to greater lengths than any President ever went before to drive out of congress all members of his party who have opposed him successfully.
One wonders why.

SINCE the day of his inauguration, five and a half years ago, President Roosevelt has had overwhelming support from congress.
His great reform measures have gone through almost without opposition. Congress has given him freely powers so vast as to be almost beyond comprehension. The billions of dollars necessary to his program have been voted almost without protest.

On only three major measures has congress balked at giving him what he has asked.
HERE are the three:
1. His proposal to destroy the independence of the supreme court.
2. His demand for reorganization of the government along dictatorial lines.
3. His punitive tax program.

THINK of it—only three times in five and a half years has congress refused to give to Roosevelt what he has asked. Many of the powers unhesitatingly granted to him have been so tremendous in their possibilities as to strike at the very roots of the American system of government, and their granting (often without taking the trouble to read the bills) can only be explained on the grounds of confidence in the President and his objectives. Almost always these powers have been given by overwhelming vote.

It is an amazing record of service on the part of congress.

Utility Plan Sets Zone Of Six Counties

Local Sponsors Arranging for Joint Meeting, With Request for Speaker on Bonneville.
A plan for a six-county public power district, embracing all of southwestern Oregon, is to be discussed in Roseburg in the near future. If plans of local sponsors materialize, the plan originally was broached at a meeting held in Klamath Falls, during the recent state arrange convention.
A request is being made of J. D. Ross, Bonneville administrator, to send a speaker to Roseburg to address a meeting, to which representatives will be invited from Coos, Curry, Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties. In each of these counties formation of county-wide power districts is being considered. It is reported, and it is proposed to work out a plan of cooperation whereby the entire area would be unified in the electrification program.
Douglas Survey Nears
The Douglas county power proposal is rapidly nearing the point of a survey, it was reported at the meeting held in this city Thursday night. Committees have been named in nearly every rural community, and the territory proposed to be served tentatively established. The committees have prepared maps of their respective communities, and have submitted recommendations for construction of transmission lines into those localities where it is believed there is sufficient population to permit the service to be maintained without financial loss. The reports from these community committees have been linked to form a plan for a county-wide transmission network, and this tentative proposal will be submitted to the state hydro-electric commission, together with a request for a formal and detailed survey. This request must be made by petition, and it is expected that circulation of the petitions will soon be started.
Under the procedure being followed, the hydro-electric commission would make a thorough study and draw up a plan for a distribution system, together with estimates of cost and approximate charges to users of power. With this information at hand, the next step would be to call an election to vote upon the matter of forming the district as outlined.
Communities of South Myrtle Creek and Coles valley were represented at the meeting Thursday night, having recently appointed their local committees. Approximately 30 rural centers of the county now have organized and are joining in the preliminary work.

TRAFFIC TOLL IN OREGON DECREASES

SALEM, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Traffic accidents in Oregon during the first seven months this year took a toll of 168 dead, compared with 191 during the same period last year. Secretary of State Snell said today. There were 3,568 persons injured in 18,362 accidents, compared with 3,933 persons injured in 20,878 accidents during the same period last year.
More fatal accidents occurred between 7 and 8 p. m. than during any other hour, while the most accidents occurred between 5 and 6 p. m.
Of the 34 persons killed, six were under 15 years of age. Twelve of the victims were women.

NOTED RENO DIVORCE JURIST PASSES ON

RENO, Nev., Aug. 20.—(AP)—The career of Judge Thomas F. Moran, who ended and started marriage for thousands flocking to this divorce capital, was closed today in death after 27 years as a jurist.
The 74-year-old judge, known as "Barney" throughout Nevada, died last night but a few weeks after announcing his retirement.
In recent years, Judge Moran was estimated to have granted 1,500 decrees annually.
Judge Moran himself preferred marriage. For 29 years, he was happily married to his first wife, Mary Lloyd Moran, who died in 1934.

Coroner Sullivan said Taylor was killed when his car plunged 150 feet down the steep canyon wall below a narrow mountain road near Bullards bar.

WORKERS' ALLIANCE RAPED BY ACTORS INTO SWITZERLAND

Abusive Control of Stage Projects Narrated at Un-American Probe.
BERLIN, Aug. 20.—(AP)—More than 1,000 Austrian Jews, it was estimated today, have been smuggled into Switzerland the past month by the modern versions of the Scarlet Pimpernel and the "underground railway."

Three hundred Swiss frontier guards are trying to cope with the problem and all available police in the northern Swiss cantons have been mobilized to help. France reinforced her guards at border points. Germans, too, promised increased vigilance, despite the fact the migration has been helped by a secret organization of Germans and Austrians, who, with earlier fugitives, supplied money and shelter for fugitives on the way to the borders, much as negro slaves were aided secretly to reach the Canadian frontier by underground railway in American Civil war days and as Frenchmen escaped during the French revolution.
Jews, fearing for their future under the Nazi regime, frequently are willing to take desperate chances to get away. Emigration from Germany has become increasingly difficult as a result of international border regulations and German and foreign laws, despite the expressed Nazi determination that they must go.

PINE-FIR PROGRAM DRAWN AT MEETING

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20.—(AP)—A basic program designed to give the northwest the greatest possible benefits from forest resources was agreed upon today by representatives of the western pine and Douglas fir industries meeting here with state and regional planning commissions, state foresters and the U. S. forest service.
The meeting, preliminary to hearings of a joint congressional inquiry, united on setting up of cooperative sustained yield units for both public and private timber, an increase in forest fire protection funds, an appropriation to fight timber insects and diseases and an increase of funds for research in forest management and utilization of forest products.

INSURGENTS CLAIM BLOODY TRIUMPH

HENDAYE, France (at the Spanish Frontier), Aug. 20.—(AP)—Spanish insurgent dispatches said today that 5,000 government militiamen were captured and additional thousands killed as Generalissimo Franco opened what apparently was a carefully planned general offensive.
Bulletins from Barcelona said, however, the government lines had held against the assault and had not lost an inch.
Observers believed Franco had given orders to his field commanders to wipe out the government's Elbro salient this week-end so a combined campaign against Barcelona and Valencia could start from consolidated positions.

Senator Pope May Race As Independent

Idaho New Dealer, Beaten at Primary, Admits He's Considering Urge of Supporters.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Senator Pope, whose defeat in the recent Idaho democratic primary was a major setback and surprise for the administration, said today he was considering entering the November election as an independent candidate.
The Idaho senator, an ardent supporter of President Roosevelt's program, declared he had received more than a thousand letters and numerous telegrams and telephone calls urging him to run.
He added in an interview that he probably would make up his mind within the next few weeks after consulting with officials here and democratic leaders in Idaho.
Since returning here, Pope has talked with Secretary Wallace and other top-ranking administration officials.
His intimates said he had been promised support, if he runs as an independent, by Wallace, Secretary Ickes and Senator Norris (Ind., Neb.) among others.
G. O. P. Voters Blamed
Friends of the senator attributed his defeat to participation of republicans in the Idaho democratic primary. Another factor was said to be the votes of farmers disappointed with low wheat prices.
Pope received about 39,500 primary votes to 42,500 for Rep. D. Worth Clark, the winner who campaigned as a conservative democrat. About 30,000 votes were cast in the republican primary.
Because the Roosevelt administration has always polled greater strength in final elections than in primaries in Idaho, Pope supporters contend he would have an excellent chance in a three-cornered election contest with Clark and Donald Callahan, republican nominee for the senate.

Farley's Action Bothered

As co-author of the new crop control act, Pope has been mentioned for possible appointment to an executive place in the agriculture department in case he abandons his candidacy.

BANK BLAST DUE TO DEBT SUFFERER

SAN JOSE, Calif., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Dynamiting of a bank at nearby Mountain View was attributed by Sheriff Lyle today to four years of increasing resentment by Lorenzo Cerrutti over a mortgage foreclosure.
Lyle said Cerrutti, 50-year-old Milpitas ranch worker, admitted he discharged ten sticks of dynamite against the side door of the Bank of America branch early yesterday. The blast caused damage estimated at \$3,000 by bank officials.

Wife of Orchestra Leader Krueger Broke Up Home, Shooter Declares

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 20.—(AP)—A young electrician's belief that another woman's domination of his wife was responsible for his breakdown was blamed by police today in the spectacular Hollywood boulevard shooting of Mrs. Emil Krueger, wife of Karl Krueger, symphony conductor.
While Mrs. Krueger lay in Good Samaritan hospital, her condition described as critical, police questioned Charles E. McDonald, 30, husband of Frances McDonald, Mrs. Krueger's maid.
Detective Lieut. George Whaley announced that McDonald confessed he fired the two shots which struck the former Chicago society girl as she ran for the safety of a dancing studio where her eight-year-old daughter, Theresa, was awaiting her.
The shooting occurred at a busy boulevard intersection late yesterday, in view of scores of terrified pedestrians who scurried for cover.
"Mrs. Krueger broke up my home," Lieut. Whaley quoted McDonald as saying, after admitting that he had followed her from her home in his car.

ABDUCTED, BEATEN, WON'T PROSECUTE

OLYMPIA, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Authorities decided to take no action today on a "kidnap scare" after the victim of two abductors returned home badly beaten and said he preferred not to prosecute.
Prosecutor Smith Troy disclosed the wife of Irving Baker, Olympian automobile dealer, told police last night "two roughly dressed men" abducted her husband after flashing what she called a "fake arrest warrant."
City, county and state officers entered the case. When Baker returned home three hours later, badly beaten, Troy said questioning of him at St. Peter's hospital brought the automobile dealers' decision to drop the case.

FASCISTS, CHURCH PARTY END DISPUTE

ROME, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The fascist party today announced an agreement ending the recently growing friction between fascism and Catholic Action, lay organization of the Catholic church.
The fascist party bulletin said that an agreement had been reached "to conform to the accords reached in 1931."
The settlement that year permitted Catholic Action to function in Italy but limited its scope to purely religious and spiritual matters.
Catholic Action has been under attack recently by a part of the fascist press.

Japs Checked At All Points, Chinese Aver

SHANGHAI, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Chinese declared today that their forces had checked the Japanese on all fronts.
The Japanese said a new large scale drive against Chinese guerrillas in Shantung province already had scattered 10,000 irregulars near Tsinan, Shantung provincial capital.
But the Chinese insisted the 42,000 light-and-run warriors in Shantung still were active and that campaigns in other areas were "continuing to be successful." Guerrillas were said to have driven within 25 miles of Nanking.
West of Kinkiang, the Yanutzze river port used as a base for the campaign against Hankow, 135 miles upstream, the Chinese claimed to have won a smashing victory when a detachment of Japanese being landed from warships, was routed after leaving protection of the invaders' naval guns.
Say invaders "Confused"
In southern Shansi province, where the Japanese have been attempting a new campaign to carry them across the Yellow river, Chinese maintained the invaders were becoming "increasingly confused" before the combined onslaughts of Chinese troops and irregulars.
The defenders declared also they had destroyed again all the railway tracks in Shansi that Japanese had repaired.
Unconfirmed reports said the high command of the Japanese armies in central China was removing its headquarters from Shanghai to Nanking, 165 miles

MUSICIAN'S WIFE SHOT AS 'MEDDLER'

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BRITISH OFFICER OUSTED BY GERMANY

LONDON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—British passport officer mysteriously seized four days ago by German secret police, was ordered out of Germany today because of what official German statement called "proof" of his conducting espionage.
British spokesmen declared the nature of the accusation against Kendrick had not been communicated to the British government.
Kendrick was passport officer in Vienna for 12 years and had been called upon to grant hundreds of British visas for Jewish refugees since the annexation of Austria by Germany.
He and Mrs. Kendrick were en route to England by automobile when he was arrested and taken back to Vienna Wednesday.

Oxygen Mask Gets Test As To Altitude



NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Howard Hughes, round the world and transcontinental record holder, hung up another record today but it was only incidental to a research flight.
Vehling non-stop from Los Angeles to New York to test a new type of oxygen mask for high altitude flight, Hughes, in his round-the-world transport plane, crossed the continent in 10 hours 34 minutes, beating the best previous transport record by almost 30 minutes. He flew at an average altitude of 20,000 feet.
In January, 1937, however, he crossed the continent in 7 hours 28 minutes and 25 seconds in a special racing plane.
New Mask Held Boon
Landing at Floyd Bennett airport, Hughes and three companions said the new type oxygen mask held great possibilities for future flight at extremely high altitudes.
"Ultimately," Hughes said, "transport operations will be conducted at altitudes of around 30,000 feet. Our present equipment and engines will not permit regular flight at that height. The point I want to make is this: That as an airplane leaves sea level the man at the controls becomes less efficient."
"A good oxygen mask permitting the pilot of the transport to breathe oxygen and air of the same density as that at sea level is going to do much toward making high altitude flying easy and efficient."
He explained that passengers in high altitude transport will not be expected to wear masks but would obtain added oxygen by direct injection of the gas into the cabin of the transport plane.
In the mask he tested, oxygen was mixed with air before it was inhaled.
Hughes' average speed with hardly any following wind, was 238 miles per hour. He disclosed that he planned a series of transcontinental flights to test the

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LEGION SPLITS ON MARYLAND PRIMARY

BALTIMORE, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The Maryland American Legion split wide apart today over the bitter primary fight between purged Sen. Millard E. Tydings and Roosevelt-backed Rep. David J. Lewis for the democratic senatorial nomination.
Bruce T. Bair, retiring commander, who started the uproar by declaring a Tydings defeat would mean an American dictatorship, reported to his critics he hadn't mentioned Lewis, but now would say:
"Sending Lewis to Washington as a senator is merely sending another rubber stamp for President Roosevelt."

BARBARA, EX-MATE ONCE MORE COOING

VENICE, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Countess Haugwitz-Reventlow and his wife, the former Barbara Hutton, went swimming together today at the Lido, with no apparent signs that bitterness had lingered from the court battle six weeks ago that ended in their legal separation.
