

PITTSBURGH DROPS TWIN BILL TO CUBS

Second-Place Giants Lose to Phillies; Yanks Win 2 to Increase Lead.

Pittsburgh suffered its first doubleheader defeat of the season Sunday at Chicago, losing 6-4 and 6-1 to the Cubs. The Bears' National league lead wasn't badly damaged, however, as the Phillies, behind the former Brooklyn pitcher, Butcher, defeated the second-place New York Giants, 8-3. The Cubs gained their third-place tie when the now-dangerous St. Louis Cardinals whipped Cincinnati twice, 7-6 and 3-0.

Brooklyn and the Boston Bees each drew one good mound performance as the Dodgers won the first clash, 6-0, behind Fitzsimmons, and the Bees turned in a 5-4 triumph for Erickson. Washington downed Boston's Red Sox, 7-2, before Joe Heying's flinging.

It looked like an impossible feat for Gabby Street's St. Louis club to escape last place not long ago when the Athletics still were going strong. But thanks to Newsom, who probably deserves a few votes for the most valuable player prize, they're in seventh place, a game ahead of Philadelphia.

HUBBELL UNDERGOES OPERATION ON ARM

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 22.—(AP)—An orthopedic surgeon removed a "loose bone" today from the crippled left arm of Carl Hubbell, the New York Giants' master southpaw.

A hospital bulletin reported the operation was a success and the famed left-hander was "getting along fine."

Hubbell was given an anesthetic and remained in the operating room almost an hour. An examination last Saturday disclosed his condition was the result of a loose bone chip in his elbow.

The 35-year-old hurler, prior to the operation, was accorded a "chance" to recover sufficiently for the final weeks of the National league campaign.

Hubbell, however, expressed belief at his age he might not "heal" as rapidly as a younger man.

In other sections of China, guerrillas also were battling furiously. Chinese reports said guerrillas had defeated 1,000 Japanese troops 20 miles southwest of Hangchow, in Chekiang province, and that guerrilla activities in the Yangtze delta had forced Japanese to rush reinforcements to many areas.

Simultaneous attacks throughout the Yangtze front led Chinese army leaders to believe the long-anticipated Hankow general offensive was under way.
