RESORT STARTED AT DEVILS LAKE

One of the outstanding recreational resorts on the Pacific coast is being developed at Devils Lake, near Delake, Oregon, according to Robin Reed, former president of Reed Bros. Co., who was attending to business at Roseburg, now dividing his time between Delake and his home at Salem. He is one of the trustees of the Devils Lake Rod and Gun club, which is sponsoring the recreational project.

Plans have been made for expenditure of more than \$100,000 in construction of facilities at the lake. Mr. Reed reports, already a \$30,000 club house has been erected, and work is being started on a \$50,000 arcade and casino building. One thousand summer home sites have been developed, and 350 have been sold. Construction of 15 summer homes started this year. A hotel is projected and plans are to be drawn soon.
