

FASTEST SPEED IN AUTOMOBILE MADE

Eyston Robbed of World's Record, However, When Timing Device Fails.

BONNEVILLE, SALT FLATS, Utah, Aug. 24 (AP)—Capt. George E. T. Eyston pounded his big automobile through the measured mile at 347.155 miles per hour today, the fastest ever attained by man on land, but failure of an electric eye timing device on the return journey robbed the Englishman of a new record.

Eyston drove his seventeen "thunderbolt" at lightning clip down the 13-mile salt track and back again for the two runs necessary to establish an official mark.

The timing apparatus, which functioned perfectly on the first run, failed to register on the second just as Eyston roared into the measured mile in an effort to better the mark of 311.42 miles per hour he established here last year.

Eyston's time for the outward mile was 10.37 seconds, far ahead of his fastest previous single run, 11.23 seconds or 317.74 miles per hour.

Officials admitted Eyston traveled faster on the return trip than on the outward sprint, possibly approaching 355 miles per hour or nearly six miles a minute, but failure of the timing device frustrated him.

"I don't feel the run was at all in vain," Eyston said. "The thunderbolt ran perfectly. I'll run again just as soon as the timing eye is fixed."

The tough-luck Englishman explained the bright morning sun caused the electric eye beam to fall. It clicks when the car's shadow passes through the beam.

25 GRADUATED AT TWO SWIM SCHOOLS

Courses at Glide, Elkton Being Followed by One at Lake Tahkenitch.

Twenty-five "swim" school students successfully passed the prescribed tests during the six-day swim schools, sponsored by the Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross, recently completed at Glide and Elkton. Of this number, which is approximately 50 per cent of those attending the classes, 10 were non-swimmers who passed the beginner's test; six advanced swimmers and nine junior and senior life savers.

Total registration for the two campaigns was 52-26 in each community. At the present time a third swim school is being staged at Lake Tahkenitch, sponsored by Reedport, Gardiner and Lake Tahkenitch. This is the first school ever conducted by the local organization on the lower Umpqua, and sufficient interest has been aroused to necessitate having a 12-day course, due to the distance necessary to be traveled to obtain aquatic instruction. More than 50 swim students of all ages have registered and are taking lessons, and indications point to an even greater number before the conclusion of the school. Instruction for all schools has been under the supervision of Maynard W. Bell, A.R.C. life saving examiner.

Those successfully meeting the graduation requirements at the Glide swim school were: Margery Norton, John Robertson Jr., and Norma Jean Shrum; those students were non-swimmers who were required to jump into deep water, swim 25 feet, turn and return 25 feet; Neil Talcott, Guy Moore, Jeanne Moore and James Underhill received swimmers' buttons for being able to tread water, float, perform plain front dive, swim 100 yards using two standard strokes, swim on back 50 feet using legs only, and perform a surface swim 25 feet, turn and return 25 feet; Neil Talcott, Guy Moore, Jeanne Moore and James Underhill successfully passed the junior life saving requirements and Genevieve Moore, Helen Horner and Watson Talcott, all junior life savers, successfully passed a re-check.

Fourteen passed the same swim tests at Elkton. Douglas Fenley, Dolores Huggs, Marian Huggs, Sherry Colley, Ted Colley, Irma Dean Gates and Elma Jean Gates passed the beginner's test. Elsie Huggs and Guy Huggs swam 100 feet and Laura DeGnath swam six feet. Zane Adams and Allen Adams were awarded swimmers' buttons. Loyd Rossen and Royall Rossen successfully qualified for the junior life saving award. The requirements for the difficult senior life saving test were successfully met by Faye Rossen and Virginia Gates, to win the coveted award, desired by many swimmers. Royall Rossen also qualified for the award but was ineligible because of the age requirement.

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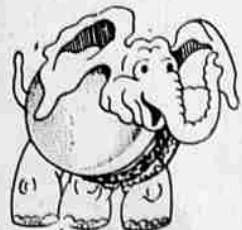

LABOR ACT CHANGES PREDICTED BY F. R.

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 24.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today representatives of labor, employers and the national labor relations board probably would be called into consultation this fall on possible changes in the Wagner labor act.

The president said he agreed with President William Green of the American Federation of Labor last week the law should be clarified, but there had been no discussion as to what specific changes might be made.

A similar announcement was made by Green after his talk with the president.

Mr. Roosevelt, talking with reporters at a conference, said in response to questions it would be necessary to get the views of quite a number of persons before determining what clarifications or amendments should be made in the law.

He asserted it was very possible that clarifying legislation would be sought in the next congress. Any changes, he added, would be considered by the labor board, representatives of all labor organizations, employers and counsel for employers.

LIQUOR INTERESTS URGE 'MODERATION'

Official Slogan Is Adopted at Meet Representing Fifteen States.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 24.—(AP)—The men—and one woman—who keep a regulatory hand on the liquor taps in 15 monopoly states walked an imaginary line today between ancient opponents, the wets and the dries. But the historical fight lacked the bitterness of decades gone by.

Delegates to the first annual convention of the national alcoholic beverage control association offered equal attentiveness to distillery executives and salesmen, who clinked bottles and flashed the labels of their products on one side of the line and the cautionary counsel of temperance educators on the other.

The association is composed of liquor commissioners and administrators from the 15 monopoly states, which allow the sale of liquor only through state-owned and conducted stores. It was formed in January, 1937, at Des Moines, Iowa, when the monopoly states withdrew from the national conference of state liquor administrators because their problems were at

variance with those of open states. The state representatives who included the only woman commissioner, Mrs. Edith McClure-Patterson of Ohio, nodded agreeably, content to remain midway, and rejecting the extremists among hard-headed traders and passionate idealists.

Moderation Foremost
Although outnumbered by the big names of the liquor industry, educators and temperance advocates put across the official slogan which dominated deliberations—"moderation—the key to liquor control."

High pressure salesmanship was absent. The distillers, in virtually every instance, accepted, even advocated the primary aim of the states and the educators—moderation. "It comes as a shock to any of us when we stop to consider what abuses of liquor can mean," said Gen. Frank R. Schwenkel, vice-president of Seagrams. "We proceed on the theory liquor can add something to the social graces but for it to bring anything to the art of living it must be used in moderation. Of course, in preaching that gospel, we have a slightly selfish interest—the preservation of the industry."

W. B. YOUNKIN OF MYRTLE CREEK DIES

MYRTLE CREEK, Aug. 25.—Word was received here today of the death of Walter B. Younkin, 73, Missouri bottom farmer, prospector and miner, who died Saturday while enroute to Luning, Nev. Mr. Younkin left Myrtle Creek a week ago after leasing his farm here and had planned to enter a soldier's home. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American war.

Mr. and Mrs. Younkin came to Douglas county from Nevada about 15 years ago and engaged in prospecting and mining, later purchasing the T. N. Humphreys farm in Missouri bottom, where they made their home.

Mrs. Younkin died last June. Mr. Younkin had been in very poor health recently.

Surviving is a stepson, W. B. Sikes, of Silver Peak, Nev.
