POULTRYMEN PLAN PROFITABLE MEET

Convention Set at O. S. C. Will Deal With Chief Phases of Industry.

"It will pay to get away for the day," is the watchword among Oregon poultrymen in connection with the two annual conventions to be held at Oregon State college September 1 and 2. The first day will be devoted to the third annual turkey industry convention, and the second to the fifteenth annual Oregon poultrymen's convention.

Poultrymen are engaged in a highly competitive business, points out H. E. Cooby, head of the poultry department, and to compete successfully it is necessary to keep abreast of new developments by checking up with the scientists and with each other in the industry.

On the turkey day program will be all members of the college poultry staff, the two poultry pathologists, Drs. E. M. Dickinson and A. S. Rosenwald; Dr. J. R. Haug, chemist; Mrs. O. C. Brown, representing the Oregon Turkey cooperatives; C. W. Norton, N. W. Dairy and Poultry Produce company and C. S. Browner, of the Hodgson-Browner Co., Portland.

Listed for discussion are slipped tendons, dry alfalfa in rations, early maturity, turkey diseases, frozen turkey meat, pooling hatching eggs, turkey broilers and fliers, finishing turkeys, and turkeys in the world poultry congress.

PWA GRANT MADE FOR DILLARD SPANS

A grant of \$54,652 for two highway bridges to replace the existing covered wooden structures near Dillard has been authorized by the public works administration, according to word received here. The application recently was filed with the PWA by the state highway commission, and the amount represents 45 per cent of the \$121,450 to be expended. The balance will be paid from state highway funds.

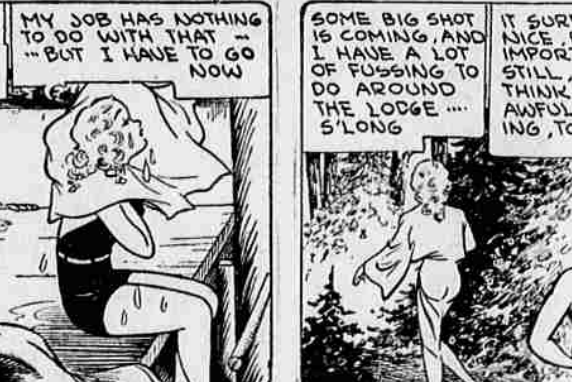
