

ROSEBURG JUNIORS BEAT EUGENE, 9 TO 7

Fourth Victory Over Lane
Lads Precedes Series
With Woodburn.

Despite pitching experiments and shifts in lineups, the Roseburg Legion Juniors yesterday administered the fourth straight defeat to the Eugene Juniors by a score of 9 to 7 in the baseball game played at Finlay field.

Faced with two games next Sunday and Monday with the strong Woodburn squad, runner-up in state competition, Coach Bob Kidder yesterday used three pitchers to give experience to hurlers whose services will be required. Both Roseburg and Eugene shifted lineups to give experience to players who will be in the regular Junior service next year, replacing boys ineligible because of age.

Andy "Lefty" McQuinn started on the mound for Roseburg and limited the Eugene batters to one lone hit, a triple by Walker in the fourth inning, and at the same time turned in six strikeouts.

Byrd, Puckett hurt over the pitching duties in the fifth. He was unable to locate the plate, walked two batters, fanned the third and then was rapped for a triple. The next man was walked; a hit to the outfield scored a runner from third and a walk and hit counted for another run to give Eugene four tallies, their first of the game. In the next inning Byrd ran into a streak of luck, when the Roseburg infield turned in a fast double play.

Puckett took his turn on the rubber at the start of the seventh inning and despite wildness managed to hold the visitors scoreless in that frame, but in the eighth he lost control and Eugene scored three runs on two hits, two walks, a hit batter and an error.

In the last inning he lobbed the ball over and let the opposing batters hit, resulting in three fast putouts in the field.

Locals Have Hifist
Roseburg batters lost no time in going to work on Smith, starting pitcher for Eugene, Ware, Roseburg second baseman, and the second man up, slapping out a home run. Roseburg scored two in the second on three walks and two errors and Smith yielded to Mortensen, who was called in from right field. Mortensen, however, was unable to check the batting attack and was nipped for 10 hits and two runs in each of the fourth, sixth and seventh innings.

Coach Kidder reports that he expects to have all of his regulars in service in the games with Woodburn next week-end.

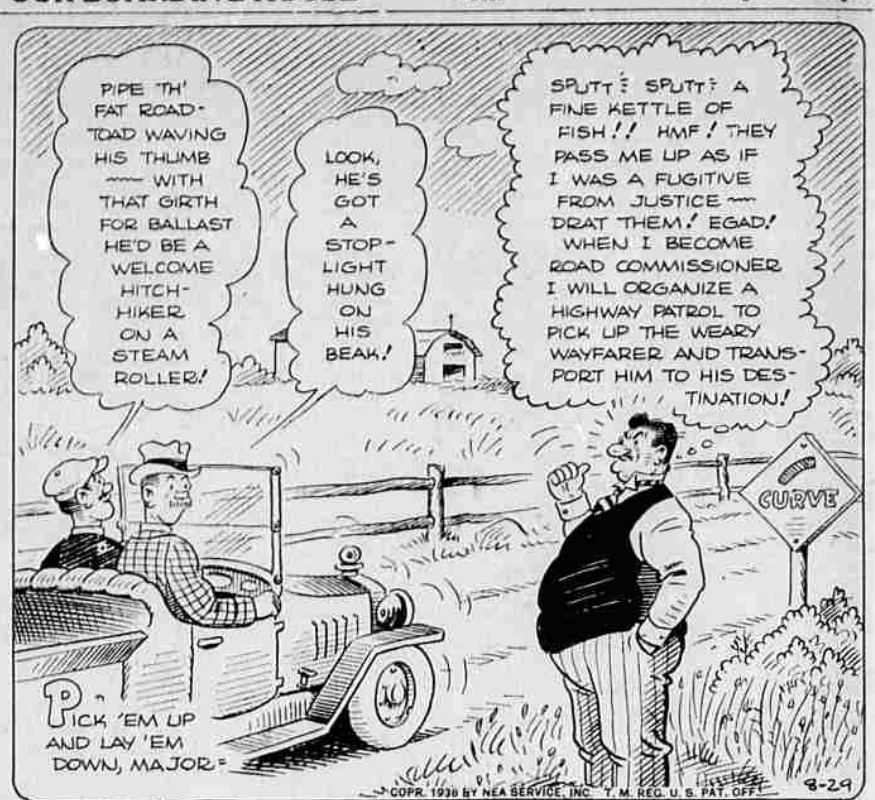

Pacific Coast baseball league standings were virtually unchanged today, although Seattle was well anchored in third place after winning six out of eight games from the fifth place and slipping San Francisco Seals.

won the support yesterday of the president's distant cousin, Col. Theodore Roosevelt, a republican.

Colleague Backs Tydings
Mr. Roosevelt will go to Maryland Sunday to inspect the site of a proposed Potomac river bridge at Morgantown, and the next day he will speak at Denton, Md., the home town of Rep. Alan Goldsborough. Denton is on the eastern shore, which some politicians have called a Tydings stronghold.

Tydings' colleague, Sen. George Radcliffe, spoke in his behalf last night. Radcliffe, who has been regarded as a Roosevelt supporter, said: "The democrats of Maryland are accustomed to select their own standard bearers. That right we will not surrender to anyone."

Connecticut democrats today were choosing delegates who will select their senatorial nominee at a convention next month. Sen. Augustine Lonergan, critic of some Roosevelt policies, is opposed by Rep. Herman P. Kopplemann and Archibald McNeil, former national committeeman. Both the latter are new dealers.

F. R.'s "Friend" Beaten
In Texas, results of democratic runoff primaries for two house seats were announced yesterday. They are tantamount to election. Rep. W. D. McFarlane, whom Mr. Roosevelt called "my friend" last month, was defeated by Ed Gossett, attorney and former oil field

worker. The latest count showed 29,782 votes for Gossett and 27,444 for McFarlane.

Linsley Beckwith, 25, defeated Brady Gentry for the seat of Rep. Morgan Sanders, eliminated in the first primary. Beckwith promised allegiance to President Roosevelt.

While democrats in several states were arguing over primary contests, republican leaders of the midwest were completing plans for their fall campaign. A "corridor conference" Saturday near Washington, Ind., heard Republican Chairman John Hamilton call the party's program "a mighty fight to save the United States."

In Washington, the republican national committee decided that Mr. Roosevelt had reduced the merit system in government to a "mere subterfuge to cover the greatest spoils grab in our history."

When he took office, its statement said, more than 82 per cent of federal employees were under civil service. But added that only 65 per cent were so classed at the start of 1938.

MORE THAN 800 ASPIRE TO CALIFORNIA OFFICES

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—California's rough-and-tumble pre-primary election contest, in which more than 800 candidates, largest field in the state's history are seeking the votes of a record-sized electorate, ends tonight.

The reentrance of President Roosevelt in the campaign with a statement opposing the California \$30-a-week pension plan was one of the latest developments. The pension plan is not on the ballot in tomorrow's election, but Roosevelt-endorsed Sen. William Gibbs McAdoo is battling for the democratic renomination against a strong champion of the proposal.

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YANKS HEADED FOR 3RD STRAIGHT FLAG

Race in National League
Tightens With Three
Teams Bunched.

The New York Yankees are rolling toward their third straight American league pennant. They look unbeatable. In mid-June they were anything but—tired, over-confident and just about fed up with this business of winning pennants. Yesterday they whipped the St. Louis Browns, 4 to 2, on only four hits—a trick accomplished via two homers by Henrich.

While the Yanks beat Newsom and Ruffing chalked up victory No. 19, the National league clubs continued to back away from the pennant.

The Chicago Cubs are having a stab at winning the flag. They whipped the Phillies, 6 to 5, in 11 innings and then bent them again, 3 to 1 in the second game. This put Hartnett's men half a game behind the second place New York Giants and a game and a half closer to the league leading Pirates.

Pirates' Lead Cut

The Pirates wavered through a long, hot ball game with the Brooklyn Dodgers, losing 8 to 5 after failing to overcome a six-run lead piled up by the Dodgers in the first two innings. The Pirates now hold a four and a half game lead over the Giants, who beat the Cincinnati Reds, 7 to 3, with Schumacher bolstering the Giants' staff with a neat sixth-inning performance.

At St. Louis the Cards split with the Boston Bees, winning 5 to 1 and losing 2 to 0.

Cleveland's Indians recovered sufficiently from their recent beatings at the hands of the Yankees to shade the Washington Senators, 6 to 5. The defeat dropped the Senators into fifth place, for the Detroit Tigers' downed the Boston Red Sox, 4 to 3, in ten innings with Greenberg hitting homer No. 45.

It was Connie Mack day in Philadelphia and the Athletics' responded by beating the Chicago White Sox, 5 to 4 and 7 to 2. Baseball's grand old gentleman was preoccupied with a plaque between games.

of school districts to the fact that many will be affected by changes in O. and C. grant land administration.

"In the past," the report states, "O. and C. funds have formed an important part of the revenue received by the schools, but such revenue has ceased at the end of the year 1937 and, for the year 1938 the school units will be deprived of the reflected, 'windfall' emanating from the application of the special school levies to the O. and C. lands of the federal government. The reason for this is found in recent 1937 legislation which allocates all funds from this source to the county alone. However, the old 'lien of taxation' theory has been discarded and funds to be received by Douglas county, as such, are derived from the 'sustained yield' method, and will be much less than received heretofore, excepting possibly during years when the sales of timber are extremely heavy."

The report, however, points out that the federal government still is in arrears from 1935 in its payments, and that the school districts will have time in which to make required adjustments.

without knowing to what extent it was to go. Baker was beaten over the head, whipped with a leather belt on his naked back, and tortured with a pair of pliers. Smith said in a statement to the prosecutor that Berry was prevented from killing Baker or emasculating him.

His statement to Troy also said he went with Berry in anticipation of only viewing a bird-dog the doctor wished to purchase. McAdoo said he understood Baker was to be only "horse-whipped."

Reddick said he was engaged to drive Berry's car. Others of the party accused Reddick of going further than that in the affair.

Two attorneys who had parts of the Centralia Armistice-day massacre trial some years ago represented two of the defendants, C. D. Cunningham of Centralia represented Berry, and William Abel of

Montesano represented Smith.

Federal Law Touched

The second warning note is now in the hands of the state patrol, and will be turned over to post office authorities, Troy said.

Sending of this note through the mail brings the case within the realm of federal authorities, Troy said.

Troy also revealed several erasures were made in the note sent this morning. It definitely revealed the "woman's touch," authorities said.

The previous warning was composed of words clipped from news papers and magazines, and pasted on a sheet of paper.

This morning, authorities said they had uncovered no worthwhile clues in connection with the first note, which sent the Baker family almost into hysterics. It took some time to quiet the two Baker children, and guards have been at the house since.

Joint Trial Planned

Troy drew the information against the four men charged with kidnapping and assault in such a manner, he said, so that it would be almost impossible for the defendants to obtain separate trials.

Important towns the invaders won in six weeks of bloody fighting. The towns were Tsienhsan, Taihu and Suzung, north of Kluksang and about 135 miles downriver from Hanhow, China's provisional capital.

The Chinese also said they had cut off Japanese advance forces at Hwangmei, spearhead of the Japanese drive up the north bank, and now were attacking the town.

The Japanese, on the other hand, reported they were advancing on the Peking-Hankow railway after having captured Luan and Shikufow, near the Honan-Anhui border about 100 miles north of the Hwangmei sector.

They said Luan was occupied during the night, with the advance guard carrying the offensive within two miles of Hwasan, 20 miles to the southwest, this morning.

Severe fighting, but no major changes, was reported on other fronts.

The Chinese said they had re-

pulsed four Japanese attempts to land troops on the west shore of Lake Poyang, south of Singze. They also reported they were holding the Japanese at bay around Juichang, 25 miles southwest of Kluksang.
