If you are perfectly sure that you are Snow White and that your opponents are Wicked Queens, you OUGHT to purge them. It really becomes a matter of principle to do so.

And the New Deal is perfectly sure that it is Snow White.

BUT a principle is a PRINCIPLE. And Senator Bennett Clark, of Missouri, has struck knives between the ribs of more things the New Deal wants than Senator George of Georgia ever thought of doing.

As a matter of principle (political morality, if you choose to put it that way) Senator Clark certainly

ought to have been purged also.

WHY wasn't he?

Well, the great moralists of the New Deal looked the Missouri situation over and sized it up something like this: "This fellow Clark is a snake in the grass, and by rights he ought to be purged, and PURGED PLENTY. But the dickens of it is that he's stronger than horse radish with the voters of Missouri, and if we start out to purge him we'll get the licking of our lives. We CAN'T AFFORD that kind of a licking, because our story is that the voters are ALWAYS WITH US and that only economic royalists oppose us."

So they pulled in their horns and kept still about Clark. That is to say, they sacrificed political morality on the altar of political expediency.

THAT'S the trouble with this political morality the headlines have been thundering about for a week. It gets it in the neck so often when political expediency comes along.

This writer knows he ought to be all steamed up about political morality, but just can't seem to get that way.

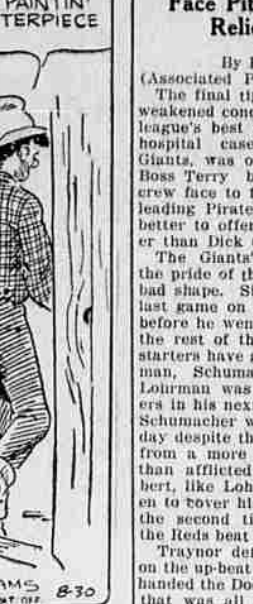
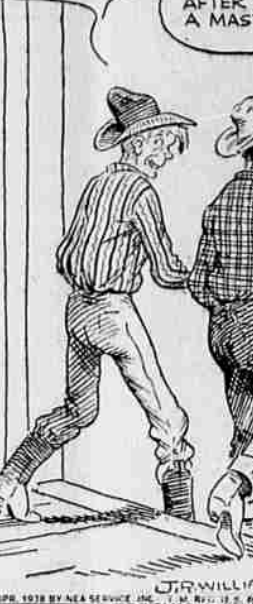

Faithful was thrown out and died almost immediately.

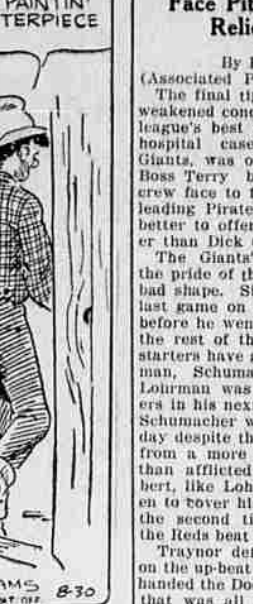

PENWANT HOPES OF GIANTS DIMMED

Runners-Up Compelled to Face Pittsburgh With Relief Hurler.

The final tip-off on the deck and weakened condition of the National league's best assortment of active hospital cases, the New York Giants, was offered today when Boss Terry brought his limping crew face to face with the long-legged Pirates and had nothing better to offer as a startling pitcher than Dick Coffman.

The Giants' mound staff, once the pride of the league, really is in bad shape. Since Hubbell won his last game on August 13, five days before he went to the sidelines for the rest of the season, only three starters have gone the route, Lohrman, Schumacher and Gumbert. Lohrman was belted to the showers in his next two appearances; Schumacher won his game on Sunday despite the fact he is suffering from a more serious arm ailment than afflicted Hubbell, and Gumbert, like Lohrman, also was driven to taver his next two times out, the second time yesterday, when the Reds beat him, 6-3.

Traynor definitely had his boys on the up-bent yesterday, when they handed the Dodgers a 10-1 trouncing that was all over after the third inning, when Pittsburgh was leading 8-1.

The Yankees, meanwhile, pulled another full boat length out front of the American league's seventh-place division. Gomez' seventh victory, and sixth in a row, coupled with Hendrick's 10th homer and fifth in three games, beat the Browns, 8-4. Since Boston meanwhile was taking a 15-1 shellacking from the Tigers and Cleveland was beaten, 6-4, by Washington, the Yanks went fourteen games up on the Red Sox.

OREGON GROWERS FAVOR PEAR PACT

MEINDORA, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Rogue river valley pear growers and packers, growers at the conclusion of a department of agriculture hearing here Monday, expressed sentiment favoring the proposed federal marketing agreement and proposed order regulating the sale and handling in foreign and interstate commerce of the five varieties of winter pears grown in the three Pacific coast states.

The hearing was recessed to continue hearings at Hood River, Yakima and Wenatchee.

Ballots will be distributed next month for voting by mail of the growers in the six fruit districts.
