RAMBLINGS

GOOD heavens, look at that field of sweet corn, I exclaimed to myself as I gazed longingly and admiringly at a forest of the green stalks in the garden of Mrs. Alma Hatfield on Roberts Creek yesterday. There must have been a quarter of an acre of it, tall, big-eared and prime.

I thought it would be a waste to have a mess; and strangely enough, this came to pass. Other toothsome foods grew richly in the name garden, the whole comprising perhaps an acre and a half of ground—cantaloupes, pole and bush beans, peas, potatoes, tomatoes and peppers, to name a few; there were many more.

Most wonderful and astonishing, throughout the garden ran shallow irrigation ditches full of clear mountain water, accounting for the excellence of quality found in the plants and their fruits, and for their sustained yield, which had extended, and will extend yet, over a long period of time. Unless you have seen it, you can have no idea just how pleasant a garden looks, irrigated as this one is.

The Hatfield home lies at the end of a low ridge, extending down from the foothills of Dodson mountain, with the garden, and fields of alfalfa, sloping gently to the bottom lands on either side. Flowing from time immemorial out of the side of Dodson is the clear little stream of water from Cooper Spring, its channel tapped high up the slope by an irrigation ditch which winds down to the fields and gardens of the Hatfield farm. Situated as that spring is, with its latent and known possibilities for use, its waters truly are liquid gold.

"This farm, purchased by my husband's father a lifetime ago, was formerly owned by Commodore Rose," Mrs. Hatfield told me. "It is an old farm; and water from that spring has been used to irrigate it ever since 1856."

"Well, you caught me at work this time, didn't you," exclaimed Howard Carnes to me yesterday. He found him, saw in hand, pole, and over a woodpile at his home in Gleggery. He spoke as if my finding him thus occupied was a novelty, but it wasn't. He's always busy, I reckon.

The wood over which he was working was pruned, "It represents the last of 40 acres, and I'm glad it's in the woodpile in-

stead of in the field bearing fruit," he told me. "It makes a lot of fuel in the fireplace, and I get a lot of good out of it. That's more than I have gotten out of the prunes for many a year!"

Part of the work which Mr. Carnes occupies himself with and the accomplishment of which he characteristically minimizes, is connected with the care of a flock of five hundred turkeys. "There may be a profit in turkey raising this year," he said. "At least I think so now. Last winter I didn't sell off my breeding stock. But this spring I bought poultry, and started in again. . . . No, I don't know that I will again feed as many as I used to. Last year I had fifteen hundred."

The Carnes home is at Carnes station, where the old Roberts

mountain road turns from the one leading through Gleggery, east of Kelly's Korner. Mr. Carnes' name was given to the station at the time, many years ago, when the railroad spur was built from the mainline of the Southern Pacific there, to the plant of the Oregon Portland Cement company which until the last few years operated its quarry at the head of the valley.

"We had a very good attendance at our community fair today," Mrs. Carnes Christian told me as I stopped at the Christian store in Gleggery Wednesday evening. "Our exhibits were fine, and the quality of the fruits and vegetables was extraordinary when one stops to think of the dry growing season we have had."

Mrs. Christian has a hobby—that of collecting petrified woods and fossils, and semi-precious stones. Many of the specimens are beautifully polished, and are housed in a glass case at the store, attracting the active interest of many of its patrons.
