GUARD BLAMED FOR "BAKING" CONVICTS

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 31—(AP)—Supt. William B. Mills today named Guard Sgt. James Hart as the man "responsible" for turning on the heat that blasted the lives of four convicts in punishment cells at the Philadelphia county prison.

Mills, testifying at a coroner's inquest in the deaths, said Hart gave an "unauthorized" order to an assistant engineer to turn steam into a battery of radiators in the prison "Klondike"—a box-like isolation building where 25 hunger-striking convicts were confined.

Mills said Hart did not have authority or his permission to have the heat turned on.

LOAN SOCIETY LOSES TAX EVASION SUIT

PORTLAND, Aug. 31—(AP)—Circuit Judge Dobson dismissed a suit by the Beneficial Loan Society of Oregon yesterday to enjoin the state tax commission from enforcing a corporate excise levy based upon net incomes of business done in this state.

"The methods, arrangements and contracts by which 90 per cent of the profits of the Oregon business are diverted to another tax jurisdiction are not bona fide business

transactions. . . . This system was devised and operated for the purpose of evading the tax law of the state."

The society is a Delaware corporation and has subsidiaries in several states.

LEONHARDT DEMO SENATOR CHOICE

LA GRANDE, Aug. 31—(AP)—The democratic party nominated John W. Leonhardt of La Grande, defeated for nomination as state superintendent of public instruction at the primary election, for the state senate in the 21st district. The vacancy was created by the resignation of Clyde Kiddle. The republicans have not yet nominated.

PIRATES, YANKEES SPLIT TWO GAMES

The Hubbell-less Giants, after yesterday's doubleheader split with the Pirates, now seem definitely out of the National League pennant race. The Giants, 64 games back of the Pirates, took the opener yesterday, 6-5, on a run in the ninth, but the Bucs banged out 16 hits for a 12-3 nightcap win.

Yesterday the Chicago Cubs had another chance to climb into the runner-up spot, but instead they fell apart in the ninth inning, lost to the Bees, 6-4, and dropped to fourth place.

This left the Bees two games over the .500 mark, in fifth place and only 43 games out of the first division. The Reds trounced the Brooklyn Dodgers, 9-2, in a night tilt behind the eight-bit flinging of Barrett to take third place from Chicago by half a game.

Yesterday's American league headliner saw the Tigers trounce the Yankees, 12-6, with Greenberg hitting homer No. 46 to remain in front of Babe Ruth's 1927 record pace. Kellner's two homers led the Indians to an 8-5 win over the Athletics, and the Boston Red Sox knocked off the St. Louis Browns 6-3.

The St. Louis Cardinals came through in the late innings twice to flail the Phillies, 2-1 and 7-6. The four-litter Whitehead pitched for the White Sox topped the Senators, 7-0.

MELLON'S ESTATE WORTH 35 MILLION

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 31—(AP)—Andrew W. Mellon left a personal estate of approximately \$35,000,000, an appraisal filed with Allegheny county register of wills disclosed today.

The appraisal did not include real estate possessed by the former secretary of the treasury at his death in August, 1937. Some attorneys estimated the real estate at \$2,000,000.

Executors of the Mellon estate said the financier gave the A. W. Mellon educational and charitable trust more than \$25,000,000 in securities and cash, and an art collection valued at \$50,000,000. Under the Mellon will the entire estate goes to the trust, with the exception of \$180,000 willed to domestic and office employees.

SKAGWAY FOUNDER, FONDA, DIES AT 82

SEATTLE, Aug. 31—(AP)—William Clark (Skagway Bill) Fonda, 82-year-old former Alaskan and model for Victor, Alonzo Lewis, died today after blood transfusions failed to revive him.

His condition became critical after an appendectomy Sunday. A familiar sight on streets here, he was one of 23 street car conductors who quit work here in the 90's when the cry of "gold" was heard in the north.

It was his boast he built the first cabin, the first bridge and laid out the city of Skagway in 1897.
