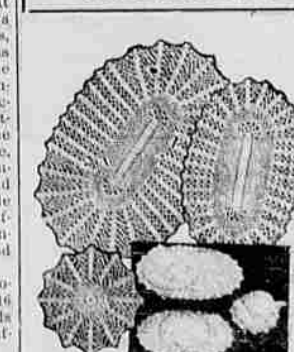
YOUNG LUTHERANS TO MEET THIS EVENING
