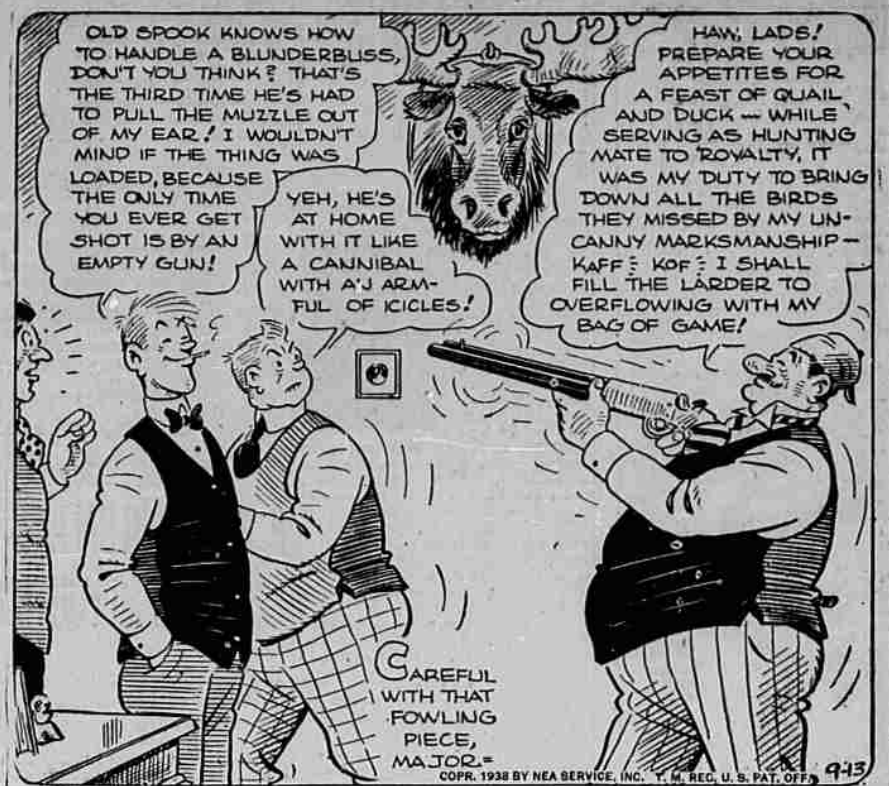

TYDINGS TRIUMPHS IN MARYLAND RACE

Somehow in recent years, the Maryland primary drew a great share of national attention in yesterday's voting because of Mr. Roosevelt's direct efforts to replace conservatives with liberals in congress.

Georgians Pleased.
Georgians watched the Maryland race for any bearing it might have on their own primary tomorrow, in which Senator Walter F. George also is seeking renomination over the president's opposition. An Atlanta audience, which heard George pledge himself last night to combat "arrogant, intolerable bureaucracy" whistled and yelled at an announcement Tydings was ahead.

George is running against Lawrence S. Camp, Mr. Roosevelt's choice, and former Governor Eugene Talmadge, William G. McRae, backed by advocates of the Townsend old-age pension program, withdrew from the field last night and gave his support to Camp.

Townsend Backing Aids.
The Townsend program was an issue in Maine, too. All three incumbent congressmen had Townsend support. All three, along with Governor Barrows, had denounced the Roosevelt administration in campaign speeches.

The democratic party's political generalissimo, Postmaster General Farley, had given his stamp of approval to former Governor Louis J. Brann, Barrows' democratic opponent, and to F. Harold Dubord, who attempted to unseat Representative Smith.

Returns From 611 of Manie's 629
precincts gave Barrows 153,064; Brann 132,931.

O'CONNOR, LESER AND NICE ALSO WIN NOMINATIONS
BALTIMORE, Sept. 13.—(AP)—As mounting returns in Maryland's hotly contested primary indicated today a victory of landslide proportions for Sen. Millard E. Tydings over David J. Lewis and the opposition of President Roosevelt, Senator Tydings said: "I am sure we will all close ranks now for the general election."

Attorney General Herbert R. O'Connor, candidate for the democratic nomination for governor, led Mayor Harold W. Jackson of Baltimore 90,435 to 68,854 in returns from 602 polling places, with only one city precinct missing.

In the republican senatorial race,

with 594 polling places reported, Oscar Leser, former Baltimore city judge, supported by Gov. Harry W. Nice had 31,085 votes to 19,556 for Galen L. Tait, who was ousted from the G.O.P. state chairmanship by the Nice organization.

Governor Nice, opposed by former State Sen. Harry T. Phoebeus, seemed assured of renomination, returning from 654 precincts showed: Nice, 35,148; Phoebeus, 5,949.

would sponsor. Claiming that the opposition would "shut off Oregon from the federal government," Mr. Hess pointed to the construction of coast bridges, federal housing and other works programs and declared that such expenditures were necessary aids to reduce unemployment.

"Oregon," he declared, "should get every federal dollar it is entitled to. We must pay the tax, so we should get back as much as we can."

"Who," he asked, "can get the most; the man who is a friend of the federal government or the man who is an enemy to the administration and its policy?"

Backed By New Deal
"Administration leaders want me to be governor of Oregon—they have said so. I was not a stranger to the federal government in the last primary and I am not a stranger now."

The speaker declared himself as favoring old-age pensions, particularly the Townsend plan, insisting that in his opinion pensions should be paid by the federal government, but that until such system can be established, the state pension plan should be liberalized.

He also urged cooperation with the federal government in power development, stimulation of industry and markets.

Money Win Predicted
Tierney, who spoke in advance of Hess, said that in traveling about the state during the present campaign he had found "a great resurgence of democratic fervor." He drew a heavy salvo of applause when he referred to Willis Mahoney, who was not present, as "the outstanding political figure of the west and our next United States senator."

Tierney referred to Hess' republican opponent, Sprague, as "a small town editor without any legislative experience or comprehensive grasp of state affairs," and stressed the assertion that Sprague had fought the new deal editorially ever since its inception.

Burke, in a brief talk, stated as his major aim a desire to liberalize pensions. He favors better coast defense and the Willamette valley development project.

SUDETENS GIVE CECHS 6 HRS. TO END MARTIAL LAW

tions and placed a ban on the exportation of iron, cotton and many other products valuable for national defense. Prime Minister Chamberlain called Britain's "elder statesmen" to his residence to consider the next move in the crisis. It was generally believed the cabinet was devoting its attention mainly to setting up Britain's war machinery. Leaders of the labor and liberal opposition groups were called into conference by the prime minister.

Sudetens Absorption Seen
German nazis, looking beyond Hitler's speech, saw only one inevitable end—the German absorption of the 3,500,000 Sudeten Germans of Czechoslovakia. The chancellor did not in specific words say that armed force would be used to assure the right of "self determination" to the Sudetens, but he announced the building of great new fortifications on the Czech frontier.

The chancellor, as nazis summarized his speech, stood firm against British and French pressure with a promise of aid when needed by the Sudeten Germans; he left the way open for peaceful settlement by admonishing the Prague government to negotiate an understanding with the Sudetens.

Pledges Aid to Sudetens
"What Germans demand is the right of self-determination which every other people possesses, and no phrases," Hitler said. "I assure the democracies that the fate of the Sudetens is not a matter of indifference to us. If these backward people feel they are without rights and aid, they will get both from us."

"On the whole it is a matter of the Czechoslovak government to arrange affairs with authorized representatives of the Sudeten Germans and to come to an understanding, one way or the other." The fascist press in Italy gave its endorsement to Hitler's declarations, asserting that "as for Italy it is superfluous to clarify her thought again, which is one of absolute and complete adherence to the German viewpoint."

Thinks Nazis Bluffing
The Czechoslovak crisis overshadowed all questions before the league of nations assembly holding its 19th session in Geneva. The league's round table may become a sounding board for any replies Britain and France have to make to Hitler's speech.

A Russian spokesman declared Geneva was the logical place for a "reply to Nurnberg" and called the Nazi tactics "a bluff to carry the crisis along until Germany is ready for action."

The wars in Spain and China, almost forgotten in the European crisis, continued with bitter fighting in the Yangtze valley and on the eastern front in Spain, but no significant changes were reported.

CZECHS' MARTIAL LAW EVOKES GERMAN TIRADE

BERLIN, Sept. 13.—(AP)—A Nazi spokesman today called the action of Czechoslovakia in imposing martial law on eight Sudeten German communities an "outright provocation."

Nazis generally expressed bitterness over developments in Sudeten areas following last night's speech by Adolf Hitler at Nurnberg pledging aid to the Sudetens.

They took the position that the clamping on of martial law and the deaths of three persons—said here to be all Sudetens—in demonstrations after the Hitler speech constituted Czechoslovakia's "answer to Hitler."

Der Angriff, organ of Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels, declared, "the cup is full!"

The newspaper Nachtausgabe, referring heatedly to the latest events, demanded "immediate and complete freedom of the Sudetens from their Czech enemies with completely free opportunity to decide their own destiny."

funds, \$200,000 for the biennium. 4. To replace funds discontinued by the federal government for cooperative extension work in agricultural and home economics and to permit continuation of present work, \$69,335 for the biennium.

Enrollment Heavily Boosted
The board declared that the only expansion represented in this, sup-

plementary request is the \$100,000 per year required to care for increased enrollment. At the two major institutions the enrollment has almost doubled since 1933-34, the increase at the state college being 108 per cent and at the university 47 per cent.

Faculty teaching loads already far beyond recognized national standards was another factor cited as making essential the supplementary funds. Total teaching staff for the current year was reported as almost 100 below that of 1929-30 when enrollment was 816 less.

Goodwin and Howard E. Foster. One Unopposed.

All of the state's six democratic congressmen are bidding for re-election. Only one, Rep. Charles H. Leavy of the fifth district, is unopposed for the nomination. The campaign in the first district, Seattle and King and Kitsap counties, has been featured by a drive by Pro-American, republican women's organization, to unseat Rep. Warren G. Magnuson in the democratic primary. Matthew W. Hill, republican candidate, is unopposed and Pro-America has been urging republicans to vote for Magnuson's democratic opponent, James W. Hodson.

Pre-election observations indicate at least 400,000 of the state's more than 800,000 registered voters should ballot on the national offices and on state supreme court, legislative and county candidates.

tested. However, the question was raised whether the PWA, which has approved a 45 per cent grant, would be willing to enter into the project in the face of a lack of decisive affirmative sentiment.

The school directors decided to submit the matter to the PWA before taking further action. Contest Not Unlikely. In the event the PWA is willing to go ahead with the project the district faces the possibility of a contest of the election, in the event some opponent of the issue is sufficiently interested to assume the court costs. In the event some irregularity could be shown, chiefly the possibility that some ineligible voter might have cast a ballot, the election might be nullified by the court in which case it would either be necessary to drop the project or call another election.

Until the decision of the PWA is obtained, the school board will withhold further plans, according to Chairman A. A. Wilder.

HARRISON WINSTON TO PRACTICE LAW

Harrison R. Winston of Roseburg was today admitted to law practice in Oregon by the state supreme court. Harrison was one of 39 applicants who took the bar examination two months ago. Forty-two of the applicants were passed, while 57 others failed. Included in the group of successful applicants was George W. Neuner, son of the former Douglas county district attorney.
