Recognizing the indispensable part that bird life plays in agriculture, the grange has again and again initiated and supported legislation for the protection of our feathered friends, and has constantly exerted its energies in behalf of song, insectivorous and migratory birds.
**EQUAL SUFFRAGE
EARLY GRANGE AIM**
As far back as 1875, the national grange endorsed equal suffrage for women and steadfastly advocated it until secured by amendment to the federal constitution in 1920. From its inception the grange practiced its own teachings by admitting women to the order on full equality with men.
The grange was the outstanding figure in securing the repeal of the national "daylight saving" law after the World war period.
Only one-eighth of the original forest area of the United States remains intact.
