WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—President Roosevelt is likely to keep out of the 1940 presidential campaign if the democratic party picks a conservative candidate unsatisfactory to him.

Although the statement came during a press conference discussion of 1938 primaries and elections, its 1940 implications were not missed by those aware of current trends in White House thinking.

The idea that Roosevelt might refuse to urge his followers to vote for the next party nominee and thereupon devote himself to building up a liberal party for 1944 is often discussed by his intimates.

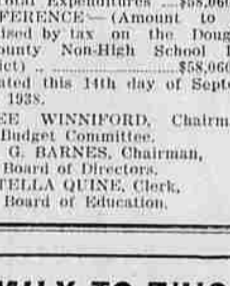
