

HEAVIER SPRAY ON APPLES PERMITTED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace, acting at the request of apple growers, raised the permitted tolerance on lead spray today to .025 grain per pound of fruit.

Apple growers and handlers had complained the lower tolerance necessitated such washing and scrubbing of apples the fruit's keeping quality was damaged. The more liberal tolerance figure resulted from experiments conducted by the public health service under a special appropriation.
