DRAIN SCOUT PATROL WINS SECOND PRIZE

DRAIN, Oct. 6.—Drain Boy Scout patrol leaders won 2nd prize at the troop leaders training institute, at Lake Clewax, Sept. 29th, Oct. 1st and 2nd, and tied for 2nd prize in camping competition, against 11 troops from the Willamette council, which included troops from Corvallis to Roseburg and west to the coast. Patrol leaders from each troop were organized as one patrol and camped in one cabin. Competition was based on camp organization, cleanliness, participation in institute events and scouting in general. The patrol selected Jim Bridger as their name. Officers of the patrol were: Patrol leader, Grant Orling; quartermaster, John Bogen; food and hikemaster, Donald Heleth; scribe, John Sneed; yell leader, Lewis Sturgess of Cottage Grove.

Activities during the institute included a flashlight hike over the sandhills, patrol hikes to points of interest, group discussions on patrol methods in scouting, handicraft work, song and stunt program and an impressive religious observance on a high sand dune overlooking the ocean, lake and forest camp.

Ernest Kotofed, oil company employee, who recently suffered critical burns in a fire which destroyed Maple row camp grounds at Drain, is reported to be making very satisfactory recovery at Mercy hospital. He was badly burned about the legs and arms and for a time was in a critical condition. He is now out of danger, however, and is reported to be resting comfortably. MINISTERS OPPOSE WILLIS MAHONEY

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 7.—(AP)—A statement opposing the candidacy of Willis E. Mahoney, ex-mayor of Klamath Falls, for the U. S. senate has been adopted by the Klamath Ministerial association and sent out to churchmen in all parts of the state. It became known here after general release of the statement.

The ministers declared that Mahoney's administration as mayor "did not exemplify the highest ideas of public and official life and was not conducive to the welfare of our city and the citizens thereof."

"Hence," the statement said, "we are of the opinion that the state of Oregon would not be best served by the election of Willis E. Mahoney to the senate of the United States."

Mahoney was not in the city today, and a friend here said he didn't know whether the senate candidate would choose to reply to the ministers' statement or ignore it.

ROBOT O. K. FOR TRAFFIC COUNTING

The mechanical traffic counters being used in various places in Oregon and 42 other states, are doing a highly efficient job, according to a report by the bureau of public roads of the U. S. department of agriculture. One such counter is located just south of Woodburn on the east side Pacific highway, and another is on the same highway in southern Oregon. About 350 such counters have been installed in 43 states.

The device operates with two beams of infra red light, parallel and 30 inches apart, projected across the highway from a light box to the "eye" of the counting device. The counter operates only when both beams are interrupted, as by a passing car. A pedestrian, interrupting only one beam at a time, is not counted. While some misuses and double counts occur, highway engineers report the mechanical counts almost as accurate as counts by observers.
