The railroad itself was still operating between Canton and Kowloon at Hongkong, the British crown colony.

More than 100 Japanese warplanes, bombers, large areas of Kwangtung province, of which Canton is the capital. Waihow suffered heavy raids.

CANTON COUNTS 123 JAP. PLANES ON BOMBING FORAY
CANTON, Oct. 13.—(AP)—A total of 123 Japanese warplanes were counted passing over this south China metropolis today on route to bombing forays in all parts of Kwangtung province. They concentrated on railroads.

A strict censorship was placed on all news concerning the landing of Japanese troops at Hsin bay and on fighting in that region. The Pearl river was ordered closed to traffic this evening and it was expected barriers would be sunk in the stream by tomorrow.

The destruction of a bridge of the Canton-Kowloon railway crippled that line to Hongkong and meant Canton, while facing the threat of direct air attacks, might be cut off from the south coast via Maou, Portuguese colony on a peninsula 70 miles south of Canton.

Reports from Swatow, a port 220 miles east of Canton, said the populace there was awakened early Wednesday by the sound of heavy gunfire near Chowyang, four miles to the south. The bomb-

ardment caused 35 casualties. The number of Japanese ships near Swatow was said to be increased to 28.

JAP PLANES ATTACK FORT 60 MILES FROM HANKOW

SHANGHAI, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Japanese land and naval forces launched a withering attack today on Shihchuan fort, just 60 air miles from Hankow, around which the invaders are slowly closing in while a new Japanese expeditionary force begins attempts to dominate south China.

Most Japanese army and navy officials here believe the new offensive near Canton, 550 miles south of Hankow, was aimed at severing southern railways and capturing the southern metropolis itself, thus facilitating the relentless drive toward Hankow, the provisional capital.

Reports gave credence to Chinese claims of successes in the Tachien sector, on the Kiangling-Nanchang railroad, where extremely bitter fighting still raged despite Japanese assertions the invaders had captured Yangshui, 15 miles south of Tachien, and had encircled the defenders of Tachien.

JAPS LAY DRIVE TO FRENCH- BRITISH AID TO CHINESE

TEKYO, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Japanese declared today British and French aid to China through Canton necessitated the new south China offensive.

"The British purpose in holding far eastern fleet maneuvers off Hongkong (last summer) was quite evident to Japan," the newspaper Kokumin said editorially. "Both British and French should recognize their abjectly view is responsible for extension of the fighting," a Nichi Nichi editorial argued.

"In the Orient there is an Oriental type of realities which is totally alien to westerners."

Outright War Admitted
The Kokumin editorial said "the China incident lacks the formalities of war but there is no doubt Japan is waging a war in China. Therefore, Japanese operations would not be hampered by mere maneuvers."

"Further we are forced to express dissatisfaction about the attitude of the foreign office in repeating Japan's policy respecting foreign rights and interests."

The mere existence of operations in south China is sufficient warning to those powers who are extending assistance to China."

The government yesterday cautioned foreign powers, including the United States, against movement of troops, warships and aircraft without today notice to the Japanese command. "Last, before any accident occurs," Britain similarly "reminde" Japan of "the risks to Anglo-Japanese relations which any incident might cause."

U. S. NOT PREPARED, BARUCH DECLARES

Several senators predicted today the troubled international situation would assure President Roosevelt a clear track in congress if he requests substantial increases in the national defense budget.

Senator King (D-Utah), who opposed the billion-dollar naval expansion program at the last session, said in view of world conditions he now was inclined to support larger appropriations for both navy and army.

Mr. Roosevelt said this week a budget increase would be necessary to provide \$150,000,000 for new warship construction next year.

Senators Favorable

Senator Borah (R-Ida.), indicated he would continue his opposition to large naval expenditures, but said he had little hope congress would accept his view. Senator Townsend (R-Ind.) has predicted that most republicans would support increases in defense appropriations.

Senator Truman (D-Mo.) declared:

"I'll not only vote for more funds for the navy, but I am going to work for an adequate appropriation for anti-aircraft guns and planes."

Congressional sentiment in favor of strengthening national defense was forecast also by Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.).

Senator Pepper (D-Fla.), recently back from Europe, said troubled conditions abroad had impressed on him a need for stronger defenses.

Would Keep Philippines
From another quarter came a proposal that the United States "earnestly consider" retaining the Philippines as a national defense measure instead of granting their independence in 1946.

Lieut. Ernest M. Eller, naval academy instructor, contended in the United States naval institute proceedings the islands might prove to be a source of strength rather than a weakness in event of a Pacific war.

As long as this nation holds the Philippines, he said, it could "check possible Japanese world aggression" and "thereby protect her own shores."

Hava (French news agency) reported from Prague a state of siege, a form of martial law, had been proclaimed in Mukacevo, and other areas in Ruthenia, Czechoslovakia's easternmost province, as the result of disorders attributed to Hungarian terrorists who had crossed the border.

Both Hungary and Poland have been agitating for the separation of Ruthenia from the dismembered republic with a view of its union to

one of them.

VIENNA, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Joseph Buerckel, Adolf Hitler's deputy for Austria, declared before a monster Nazi mass meeting tonight Theodore Cardinal Inuitzer was attempting to make Austria choose between "Christ and Adolf Hitler."

"Hitler or Christ is not the question," he shouted through loudspeakers to a cheering crowd of 100,000.

"Hitler never took a position against Christ."

"In this state there is only one fuhrer and his name is Adolf Hitler."

Buerckel accused a part of the Catholic clergy of seeking to "instigate people against the state."

Every time Cardinal Inuitzer's name was mentioned the crowd shouted "Pfal, pfal!" the German equivalent of "boo!"

Nazi demonstration tonight accused a part of the Catholic clergy of seeking to "instigate people against the state."

In the midst of a Nazi campaign against Cardinal Inuitzer and "clerical agitators," Buerckel blamed as "instigators against the state" a number of "political talking clericals who have been deprived of influence through national

socialism (nazism)."

He referred to anti-Catholic riotings last week-end and said demonstrations have occurred on the streets in attempts to play religion against the state.
