

MAYORALTY SEEKER DEALS OUT HUMOR

GRAND COULEE, Wash., Oct. 20.—(AP)—H. A. (Windy) Johnston threw his hat into the ring for Mayor of Grand Coulee today with the slogan: "Do unto others as they have done unto me." Johnston is well known as the good-humored editor of the "Coulee Dam Sneezer-Gabber" at this Grand Coulee dam construction site.

"A bankrupt man for mayor of a bankrupt city, that's me," Johnston declared in announcing his candidacy.

"I'll take good care of people on relief. I'll probably be there myself next winter."

WOMAN KILLS HER HUSBAND AND SON

EL PASO, Texas, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Jose Fuentes, 59, El Paso sign company owner, and his five-year-old son, Faustino, were fatally shot here today and Mrs. Fuentes, 20, was wounded in what authorities described as a double slaying and attempted suicide.

Officers quoted Mrs. Fuentes as saying she shot her husband and son and then herself because she was "dependent and hysterical" over her husband's ill health.

Mrs. Fuentes' wound was not serious, hospital attendants said.

LA GRANDE KILLER ACCUSED OF MURDER

LA GRANDE, Ore., Oct. 20.—(AP)—District Attorney George Anderson today charged Jess Phillips with first degree murder and assault with intent to kill.

The charges grew out of the fatal shooting last night of Frank Bryant, 44-year-old millhand, and the wounding of his woman companion, Mrs. Elsie Carlson, 33.

Phillips, 46, a logger, was released from the city jail Wednesday after serving a sentence on an assault and battery charge filed by Mrs. Carlson. He was arrested immediately after the shooting when he appeared at police headquarters.

NAZIS REACH FOR PHILIPPINES TRADE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Guarded German inquiries on commercial prospects in the Philippines produced official speculation today whether the Hitler regime was eyeing the far east as well as South America as a trade outlet.

The most recent inquiry, made by a business man described as influential in Nazi trade councils, caused government officials concerned with far eastern affairs to scan late commercial reports. They learned:

Germany, along with Japan and Italy, shared last year in increased sales to the Philippines, despite the islands' free trade ties with the United States.

Germany is building a second new ship for the Philippine government. Italy is constructing two commercial vessels for inter-island trade.

Germany has increased material for its shipping links with the islands and the far east generally, adding three of the fastest liners

connecting the Orient and Europe. Italy last year made Manila a port of call for its liners.

Efforts have been made to organize the Germans living in the Philippines into a bloc, as in other foreign lands.

Regardless of immediate intentions, some officials believe Germany hopes to make future heavy trade gains in the islands and the far east generally, by capitalizing on political friendship with Tokyo.

Japan has made no secret of the intention to dominate the Orient at least commercially, and already has nibbled at Philippine-American trade in advance of the independence which congress voted to give the Filipinos in 1946.

POOLE'S PLEA ON BRIEF REJECTED

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20.—(AP)—The state supreme court rejected today the request of Harry W. Poole, Klamath Falls theatre operator, that he have until January 20 to file the brief in his appeal from an eight-year sentence for rape.

The high court gave Poole un-

til December 1 to file the brief. The defense application was opposed by District Attorney Blackmer of Klamath county. Poole, who is free on \$5,000 bail, contended the extra time was needed because the circuit court reporter could not complete the transcript testimony within the customary time limit.
