

LOMBARDI AT TOP IN SCRIBES' POLL

Cincinnati Catcher Voted Most Valuable Player in National League.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Following as it usually does, the best hitter or the best pitcher in the league, the award for the most valuable player in the National League in 1938 goes to Ernie Lombardi, an Italian playing an American game in a German town.

The big Italian who catches for the Cincinnati Reds rolled up 229 points in the voting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America. He is the first Cincinnati player ever to win the title.

Lombardi has much to recommend him. He led the league in hitting with .342 and according to his manager, Bill McKechnie, had much to do with the success of the Reds' young hurlers this year. He cannot run fast enough to scare any infielders but he is a big calm resourceful catcher with an arm like a bull-whip.

Ernie, or "Bossie" as they called him in his salad days at Brooklyn, was placed first on ten of the 24 ballots of the writers' voting committee, a fine percentage considering the opposition.

He was 63 points ahead of Bill Lee, the Chicago Cubs' hurler, who finished second. Lee was one of the main reasons for the Cubs' perky showing in the late season drive. He worked four days in a row in the final week of the season. His 22nd victory of the year clinched the pennant for the Cubs.

Just behind Lee was Arky Vaughan, the Pittsburgh Pirates' shortstop and leading hitter. He wound up with 163 points to Lee's 156. Mel Ott, the Giants' perennial boy wonder who topped the league in driving home runs, was fourth and Buck McCormick, the Reds' large rookie first baseman, fifth.

McCormick should be satisfied. For first year men get that close to the top.

Gaby Hartnett, the Cubs' catcher, Mace Brown, Pittsburgh relief hurler and McCormick all received votes for first place, though not with Lombardi's frequency. Ducky Medwick, last year's winner, didn't get one and wound up 11th.

Lombardi is 39 and lives in Oakland, Calif. He came up to Brooklyn from the Coast league but was traded to Cincinnati in 1931. He has been there ever since, slightly overshadowed by the presence of Hartnett in the same league, but a valuable hand just the same.

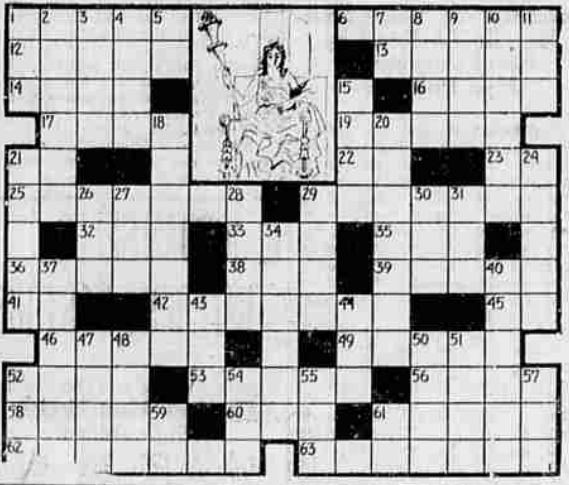

INDIANS WILL TAKE ON COTTAGE GROVE

Final Home Grid Battle Of Season Scheduled for Next Friday.

The Roseburg high school Indian football team, with two scalps taken from the luckless Golden Tiders of Eugene and the Marshfield, 15-0, rates hanging proudly from their victory belt, opened a week of intensive training on Friday field last night in preparation for the final home game of the 1938 season here this coming Friday evening against the Cottage Grove Lions.

The Indians, despite the fact that the team has been crippled from serious injuries and practically no reserves from which to secure replacements, have protested to upset the "old dope bucket" in their last two games, to emerge with decisive wins. Coach Jim Watts' Orange and Black gridiron stalwarts, after opening the season with a listless 7-7 tie with an underdog Reedport eleven, met reverses in their next two games against Medford and Lebanon high schools, only to make a comeback on the home stomping ground to thump Marshfield, 12-0, and University high, 13-0.

In the game last week against Coos Bay Pirates, Coach Watts was forced to open the contest with two reserve backfield men when injuries from the game a week before deprived him of his ace right and left halfbacks, Bob Dishman and George Sanders. To the surprise of a packed grandstand and to Jim Watts himself, these two youngsters to the starting backfield, Virgil Sanders and Nurdyke, stole the show, thereby earning serious consideration as possible starters in the remaining games.

The Indians' brilliant left half, George Sanders, the triple-threat back who also directs the team's play, is rapidly rounding into shape after a two weeks' layoff and should be ready to open in his customary position against the Lions, provided he can out his hard-running and hard-tackling little brother, Virgil. If he does, either young Sanders or Nurdyke will open in the right half spot.

Only two games will remain to be played after the Indians meet Cottage Grove here Friday night, one against Grants Pass, there, in the traditional Armistice day game, and the wind-up against Springfield, there, on November 18.
