

INDIANS DRILL HARD FOR COTTAGE GROVE

R. H. S. Determined to Win Season's Final Game on Home Gridiron.

Heavy rains of the past few days have not deterred Coach Jim Watts from sending his charges through stiff workouts on Finlay field in preparation for the final home game of the current season against Cottage Grove high school tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock.

The entire squad is in good shape for the lion contest with the exception of Coach Watts' ace half-back and flinger left half-back, George Sanders, who played a home in his foot late in the final quarter against University high school's Golden Tiders, forcing him to see the Marshall field game from the bench. Sanders is slowly rounding into shape but finds it difficult to go at top speed when he's in there. Watts is undecided whether to start his triple-threat back or open with George's understudy, brother Virgil Sanders, who despite his mere 120 pounds or so, performed so admirably against the beefy Coos bay Pirate eleven.

If Headman Watts holds out his star performer, to use only if the necessary situation arises, then Eddie Norbyke, the Gotham state speedster, will again assume the right half duties, teaming with Tom Marshall at quarter, rugged Keith Kennedy at fullback, V. Sanders at left half, to compose the starting backfield combination.

"Swan Song" for Eight
Tomorrow night's game will be the "swan song" for eight Orange and Black gridiron heroes, who will play their last game for R. H. S. before the home crowd. All eight are regular members of the starting lineup. Gone will be George Sanders, left half; Kennedy, fullback; Marshall, quarter; Simon, end; Church, end; Parrott, guard; Kerstner, guard; and Winberly, center. Besides these men who will play no more football for the Indians will be Charles Scofield, the only dependable reserve lineman, who plans on moving to Eugene at the end of this week.

According to Coach Watts, the Indians plan on shooting the works against Cottage Grove. Two wins in succession over tough opponents have placed the local gridsters in the right frame of mind to go after a "big piece of lion meat." The Lions, fresh from a convincing 15-7 triumph over Brimfield, whom the Indians play in the last game of the season, will be far from push-over, and will be out to avenge the 20-6 win Roseburg took last season.

JOE LOUIS SIGNS TO BATTLE LEWIS

NEW YORK, Nov. 3—(AP)—Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis

agreed today to meet John Henry Lewis, the light heavyweight king who has been banking for faster company for a long time.

When Mike Jacobs called the two together this morning to sign papers for a bout at Madison Square Garden January 27, he set up the first all-Negro heavyweight championship contest since Jack Johnson met Battling Jim Johnson in Paris 25 years ago.

The match left all hands a little astonished because it had been sidestepped so long it was considered about as probable as an invasion from Mars. An active campaigner, Lewis made one of his fairly frequent title defenses just last week against Al Gainer, another Negro, at New Haven, Conn. But the bout drew only 4,000 cus-

tomers and preserved the former Phoenix, Ariz., piano player's record of never having made any important money out of the title he took from Bob Olin in St. Louis in 1935.
