Don't be fooled! The Law (hic) and Temperance (hic) League is largely the liquor interests. "Heavy losses" would be only to them. Every beer truck carries a "Vote 323 X No" sign.

5. Stop increase of sales of liquor by removing retail private profit.

6. Provide funds for investigation and prevention, thus reducing relief needs.

7. Reduce enormous loss to citizens from increasing auto accidents; repairs, hospital, doctor bills, loss of time, etc.

SAVE LIFE—1. By making highways safer for travel.

2. By reducing number of greatly increased liquor auto accidents. (Over 35,000 fatal in U. S. A. last year. Many here.)

SAVE YOUTH—1. Wipe out 4000 Beer Saloons, many of which sell to minors.

2. Prevent sale of beer and wine to minors by requiring permit.

3. Remove temptation by destroying many "joints."

4. Provide free text-books for scientific education of youth as to evils of alcohol.

5. Make it easier to control bootleggers, who are still with us under other names.
