Umpqua River Bridge
Sealed proposals will be received by the Oregon State Highway Commission in the auditorium, third floor Public Service Building, Portland, Oregon, at 2 o'clock p. m., Friday, November 18, 1938, for the construction of the Umpqua River Bridge, Section of the Pacific Highway in Douglas County. These proposals will be publicly opened and read aloud at 2:30 o'clock p. m. at said date and place. Bids received after the time fixed for opening will not be considered. Improvements will involve the following approximate quantities: 500 cubic yards structural excavation, 500 cubic yards concrete, 115,000 pounds metal reinforcement, 25,000 pounds structural steel, 250 linear feet handrails, 27,000 cubic yards excavation single classification, 2,200 cubic yards gravel, 250 tons Class "A" asphaltic concrete, 250 tons cutback asphalt in wearing surface, 700 cubic yards crushed gravel in base and surfacing.
