Richard Sandis is out of school this week on account of illness.

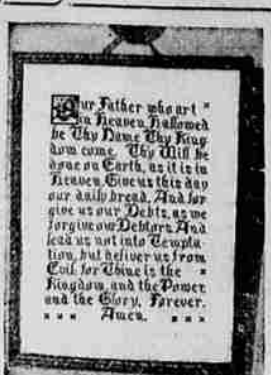
Harry Hill, of Creswell, spent the week-end with his family here.
