

WEARER OF SLACKS
DRAWS JAIL TERM

Children's Teacher Flouts
Judge's Warning When
She Goes to Court.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 15.—(AP)—A 28-year-old kindergarten teacher wore blue slacks and a red and white blouse into court today and was sent to jail for five days for contempt by Judge Arthur Guerin. The teacher, Miss Helen Hulick, who looks like Screen Actress Marlene Dietrich, flouted Judge Guerin's warning yesterday when in his courtroom must dress like women. He told her she could not take the witness stand because she was wearing gray-green slacks and a flamboyant yellow sweater. He told her to come back today, wearing a dress. Miss Hulick came back, took the witness stand and testified against two negroes charged with robbing her house. Judge Guerin ignored her as she opened her coat and displayed the slacks and sweater. When she finished her testimony the bailiff led her to the prisoners' bench, and there she heard the court order her to jail. "Well, they can imprison me, but they can't imprison my soul," she said as she was led to jail. "Any-way, I'll have time in jail to paste up my scrap book with poems, mostly children's verses."

CHANGSHA FIRED BY FLEEING CHINESE

SHANGHAI, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Changsha, capital of Hunan province and next major objective of the Japanese, appeared today to be doomed to destruction by fire before the Japanese arrive. Fragmentary advice reaching Shanghai indicated the populace of the city was panic-stricken at the prospect of quick entry by the invaders, while Chinese troops burned buildings in keeping with their "scorched earth" policy. The majority of Changsha's foreign residents were said to have taken refuge in the Standard Oil installations on the banks of the Siang river outside the city, where they were guarded by the British gunboat Sandpiper. A group of foreign missionaries, however, mostly Americans, remained within the compound of the American Hunan Bible institute, inside the walls of the burning city. It was believed they would be reasonably safe there.

ARGENTINA PEGS PRICE OF WHEAT

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 15.—(AP)—President Ortiz by decree today pegged the price of Argentine wheat at seven pesos a hundred kilos, the equivalent of 43 cents a bushel.

Planters may sell either to exporting firms willing to pay the pegged price or more, or may dispose of their crops to a national grain board which Ortiz created in another decree. The decrees followed three conferences at which the minister of agriculture declared Argentina was burdened by an over-supply of wheat.

NEW GOVERNOR TO OUST RACKETEERS

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Governor-elect Julius P. Heil, of Wisconsin, said today he was going to be "fring line" governor and work to restore industrial peace by "courtous" ousting of labor racketeers.

He said he did not interpret his victory over former Governor Philip F. LaFollette as a blow at the new deal, declaring purely local issues were involved. "The LaFollettes had endeared themselves by working for 40 years on the state payroll," he said in an interview. "Maybe you'd better put that 'endeared' in quotes." Heil came here to attend the auto show. "We are going to have no strikes and no picket lines," he said. "Labor disputes are chiefly caused by mismanagement and by racketeers who try to coerce workers for their own benefit. I am going to run those racketeers out of Wisconsin, courteously if I can. "As governor, I'm going out on the fring-line."
