

# FRANCE WARNED BY FASCIST JOURNAL

## Crisis Over Tunisia Brings Assertion That Italy Is "Ready to March."

ROME, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Fascist Editor Virginio Gayda, who often reflects Premier Mussolini's own views, warned France today Italy is ready to march—even against France—if it is necessary.

Gayda's declaration in the newspaper *Giornale D'Italia* sharply underscored the strain on Italian-French relations since Wednesday when Italian deputies demanded, in the presence of 11 dates, the recognition of Italian interests in Tunisia, France's north African protectorate.

Gayda made the assertion in denying alleged French insinuations of collusion between the Italian royal house and the fascist regime last September. Mussolini then cast Italy's lot with Germany before the Munich conference when Europe seemed to be on the verge of war.

Italy, Gayda declared, is united "solidly behind its government and is ready for everything today... ready to march—even against France—if it is necessary."

PARIS, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The so-called "Fascist" from fascist domination in the Italian parliament during a speech by the foreign minister, Count Ciano, Wednesday provoked the international situation and led Foreign Minister Bonnet last night to request "explanations" of Italian intentions toward Tunisia, Djibouti and Corsica.

The fascist press continued the matter and French officials are believed to mark the beginning of a German and Italian campaign to compensate Italy in the Mediterranean for fascist support when the Nazis got Austria and part of Czechoslovakia.

Inasmuch as France and Great Britain agreed to the partition of Czechoslovakia on the theory that the Sudeten Germans had the "right to dispose of themselves" in selecting a government, French commentators acknowledged Italy could highly embarrass France by demanding the same right for Italians living in Tunisia.

# IRISH ON HAND TO BATTLE TROJANS

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The Irish of Notre Dame march into Los Angeles today, thirty-six strong, for their thirteenth annual foist on the gridiron with the Trojan warriors of Southern California.

The invaders, riding high along an unbroken trail of eight victories, will be taken into seclusion.

The Irish followed a custom originated by the late Knute Rockne in stopping over in Tucson, Ariz., for final practice sessions, and sent word about the squad was in splendid shape for the game.

Southern California backers were more hopeful than confident of victory, but few would be down-right surprised if the Trojans upset the Irish. They think Notre Dame should be favored, but that the Irish will have a fight on their hands to win.

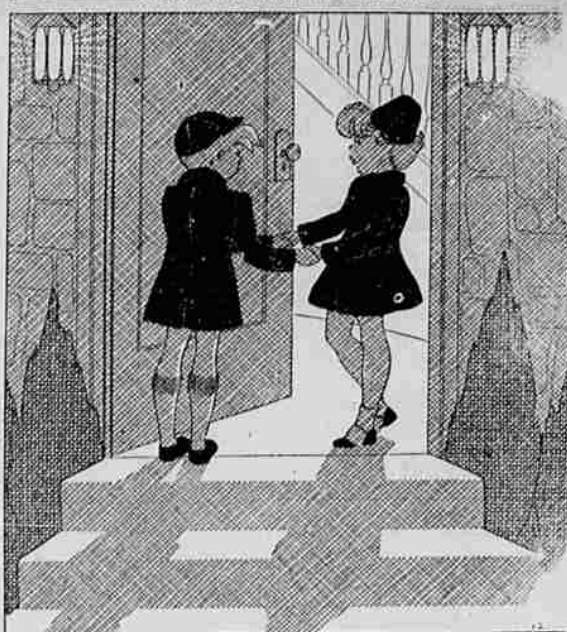

# LEBANON BIDS FOR PLYWOOD PLANT

LEBANON, Ore., Dec. 2.—(AP)—A city industrial committee and executives of the Harbor Products corporation, the world's largest plywood manufacturing concern, negotiated today on the proposed transfer of major mill units from Hoquiam, Wash.

Following the company's inquiries concerning a site, Lebanon voted a \$17,000 municipal fund surplus at a special election last week to develop city-owned industrial sites. City spokesmen said the corporation had offered to lease a site for ten years at 4 per cent a year on the public's investment.

The company proposed constructing a peeler plant and investing \$200,000 in equipment and machinery. The operation would employ about 125 men. The addition of other units was suggested for the next five years.

The Harbor concern has been purchasing the bulk of its logs from Santiam forest loggers because resources have been reduced in the Hoquiam area. The Santiam offers one of the northwest's largest stands of ripe, uncut timber. Committee representatives asserted the company would save vast transportation costs by opening a plant here. They added a decision would be reached within a few days.
