LEGION AUXILIARY MEMBERSHIP DRIVE CONTINUING THIS MONTH

Friendship and understanding among nations as a basis for enduring peace is the goal of Fidae, the inter-allied federation of World War veterans, which has a large membership in Roseburg. Mrs. Thomas Parkinson, Fidae chairman of Umpqua unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, stated today.

Every veteran enrolling in the American Legion also enrolls in Fidae and every woman becoming a member of the American Legion Auxiliary also becomes a member of the Fidae Auxiliary, she explained. An active program for promoting good will among nations is carried out each year by the Auxiliary and provides highly interesting work for Auxiliary members.

The name "Fidae" is coined from the letters of the French name of the federation, "Federation Inter-alliee des Anciens Combattants." The organization includes the veterans groups and women's auxiliaries of eleven countries allied in the World War and has approximately 8,000,000 members, making it the largest organization in the world. Headquarters are maintained in Paris and an annual congress is held in the capital of one of the countries.

Through the Fidae, the American Legion Auxiliary women have direct contact with the women of Europe. The history and customs of the various countries are studied, pageants and plays given, and similar activities carried out to promote friendship and understanding. The work is considered especially important to the cause of peace at this time due to the tense world conditions. Local Auxiliary members will have full opportunity to take part in Fidae activities during the coming year, Mrs. Parkinson said.

RAIL ASSN. OPPOSES LARGER TRUCKS

SALEM, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Harold Turner, representing the Association of Oregon Railroads, conferred today with the Marion county court in opposition to a bill he said would appear in the Oregon legislature to increase the length, height and load limit of trucks carrying for hire.

Turner was said by a member of the court to have stated that a third of the railroads of the country are in receivership and others in danger of going the same way, and that the coming session of congress may have to determine whether private ownership of railroads will continue or the government take them over.

County Commissioner Roy Melson said the counties, he believed, did not intend to encroach on any question of load limits on state highways, this being for the state to decide, but he believed the counties would unquestionably oppose any bill that would take from the counties the right to control load limits on county roads.

"Such a provision was in a bill before the 1937 legislature," said Melson. "County opposition immediately developed and it was eliminated without much argument."

HENRY M. DEWEY PASSES AT SALEM

Henry Martin Dewey, 32, son of Mrs. Frank Brown of West Roseburg, died in Salem Sunday after a prolonged illness. He was born at Glendale, Oregon, January 6, 1906, and spent the greater part of his life in that community.

The body is being brought to Roseburg by the Douglas Funeral home. Funeral services will be held in the Presbyterian church in Glendale Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock. Interment will follow in the Masonic cemetery in that city.

NEW LAW STYMIES MARRIAGES HERE
