MUSICA PROBE GOES INTO MURDER CASE

(Continued from page 1) sentence was commuted to life imprisonment. Later he was released. As a result of the affidavit Coster-Musica was indicted on a charge of subornation of perjury but he was never brought to trial.

The indictment, McDermott said, was dismissed in 1929, three years after Coster-Musica had become McKesson and Robbins president and had hidden his criminal past.

There was the possibility, the inspector remembered, that the Cohen brothers, remembering Coster-Musica's part in the case, had stumbled across the fact that the dignified white-haired financier who had slipped unobtrusively into "Who's Who in America" was none other than their old acquaintance, Philip Musica, son of an immigrant Neapolitan barber.

Coster-Musica, McDermott said, naturally would have feared exposure. "Well, what are you going to do for me?" the man asked when Musica told him he had risen since the days of the infamous big man hair swindle of 1913 and the dubious dealings in alcohol during prohibition.

"Why didn't you know?" Coster replied. "This very minute you became" and he named a post in McKesson and Robbins. Got \$6,000 a Year.

Simon has been on the corporation's payroll at \$6,000 a year and expenses for five years. Assistant U. S. Attorney General Brien McMahon said last night: "I assume he was drawing \$6,000 a year for what he knew instead of what he did."

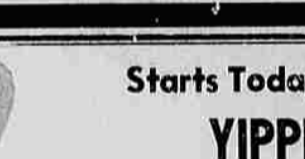

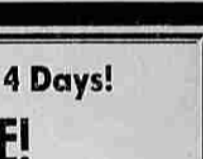
