20 RESCUED FROM DISABLED VESSEL

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Twenty persons, including two women, were rescued from the disabled Norwegian freighter Smaragd in the gales-went Atlantic 500 miles southeast of New York today by the American freighter Schoadack.

VIENNA CHOIR BOYS CHEERFUL IN U. S.

Yule Approach Finds Them Gay Even Though 4,000 Miles From Home.

Associated Press Arts Editor NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—The voices of 20 little boys 4,000 miles from home are bringing tears to the eyes of sentimentally inclined New Yorkers this holiday season at the Radio City Music hall.

It is the first appearance in a theater of the Vienna choir boys, whose fragile voices from many thousands of young throats have charmed the world for four centuries and a half—since Emperor Maximilian I founded the unique boarding school for pre-adolescent boys on July 7, 1488.

But a number of people whose hearts were wrung at the sight of 20 youngsters singing for their supper so far from home and their parents' traditional Austrian Yule celebrations have had a shock when they traced the boys down to their hotel near Gramercy park.

The 20 youngsters in their off-stage sailor suits are not a bit downhearted.

Nurse Kept Busy Most of their free time, when not touring, is spent in a big recreation room on the 18th floor of their hotel. It's one of the busiest places in New York for four centuries filled and usually a circle of older guests envying the fun.

At a long table in the center Harold and Hans are finishing up a creche made of cardboard, colored with crayon. Ping pong, chess, dominoes and a boyish variation of double patience go on continuously.

On the end of the row of tables helps the boys with their makeup. Sometimes she binds up cut fingers, occasionally she comforts a homesick lad. Mostly, she seems to spend her time sorting through the duffelbags of the youngsters, noting holes in stockings, missing buttons and similar catastrophes of boyhood. At the music hall she helps the boys with their makeup—they aren't very good at putting it on themselves.

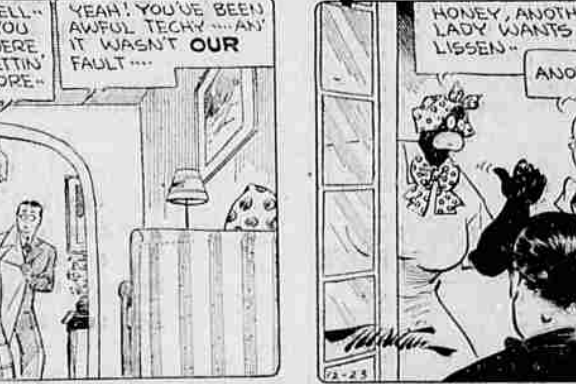

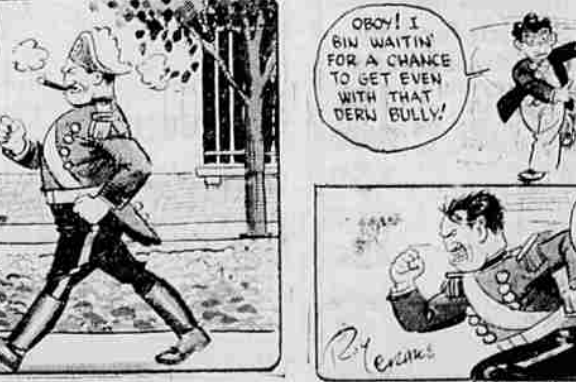

REHEARING ASKED BY HARRY BRIDGES

C.I.O. Leader Says Court Contradicted Self in Contempt Cases. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Harry Bridges, C.I.O. director of the west coast, contended in an action in the California supreme court today the court contradicted itself in rulings on the same issue in separate contempt cases involving the Los Angeles Times and himself.

Bridges asked for a rehearing of a case in which he was fined \$124 for contempt because he criticized in a published statement a Los Angeles superior court decision in a labor union dispute.

In the Los Angeles Times case the supreme court granted the newspaper a writ of review in a case in which it was found guilty of contempt for publishing editorial comment on Los Angeles court rulings.

Bridges asserted the problems of "constitutional, general, and procedural law at issue in both cases are in major respects identical."

The court acted on the Bridges case December 1, several days before the Los Angeles Times decision was handed down.

Bridges was adjudged guilty of contempt because he termed "outrageous" a decision by Superior Judge Ruben Schmidt of Los Angeles appointing a receiver for the San Pedro local of the Longshoremen's union. Bridges' criticism was contained in a telegram to Secretary of Labor Perkins. The content of the telegram was released in the press by the C.I.O. publicity department.
