JUSTICE DEPT. EYES NAZI, RED CONDUCT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today the justice department had undertaken an investigation of alleged violations of the criminal statutes by nazis, communists and certain other organizations in this country.

The president told a press conference Attorney General Murphy had informed him to this effect by letter. The letter was not made public but Mr. Roosevelt said the alleged violations were submitted to the department by the Dies committee investigating un-American activities. The chief executive would not comment on reports he opposed a request by Chairman Dies of the committee for an additional \$150,000 to carry on its inquiry. The committee has exhausted its \$25,000 original fund.

Dies asked a federal investigation to determine whether the communist party, the German American Bund and other organizations had violated federal laws by failing to register as agents of foreign principals.

JUVENILE GRANGE STARTS NEW PROJECT

YONCALIA, Jan. 6.—Organization of a 4-H club forestry project within the Elk Creek juvenile grange at Yoncalia, is one of the latest activities of Jack Wilson, tireless Yoncalia worker among young people.

Although badly handicapped through being crippled, Mr. Wilson has been one of the outstanding workers among young people in the northern part of the county. Through his efforts the Yoncalia juvenile grange has become one of the largest in the state and is at work on a number of important projects.

The new forestry club has 12 charter members. The officers are Paul Risting, president; Velma Berghill, vice-president; Dorothy Sehl, secretary. Other members include Laura and Edith Jobe, Billy McKern, Zara Potter, Elwyn Swearingen, Paul Parker, Jimmy Madden, Stanley Ludwig and Edison Weber.

U. S. DEBT MOUNTS AT INCREASED PACE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The government finished the first half of the fiscal year 1939 running into the red three times as rapidly as a year ago.

The daily treasury statement issued today showed spending exceeded income by \$1,501,929,303.13 at Dec. 30, 1938. This compares with excess of expenditures totaling \$52,541,774.07 for the first six months of the fiscal year, 1938.

For the first six months of the current fiscal year the statement showed shrinking income and expanding expenditures. Total receipts for the first six months were \$2,927,285,396.99 compared with \$3,176,213,515.70 for the corresponding period in the 1938 fiscal year.

During the six months just ended total expenditures swelled to \$4,529,205,700.72, compared with \$3,728,755,290.37 in the like fiscal period a year ago.

A sharp run-up occurred in emergency expenditures. In the six months just ended, recovery and relief spending rose to \$1,512,712,090.22 from \$1,020,411,111.50.

The gross public debt climbed somewhat more than \$2,000,000,000 over the corresponding date last year. The total at Dec. 30, 1938 was \$39,127,183,901.04, compared with \$37,374,341,518.10 on the corresponding date a year ago.

WORK IS STARTED ON TENMILE SCHOOL

TENMILE, Jan. 6.—Preliminary work on the construction of a new school building for the Tenmile district was started this week by R. J. Hillstrom, Marshfield contractor, to whom the project was awarded on the low offer of \$39,995. The bid was the lowest of the six proposals received.

Forms are in place for foundations and a two-room office has been built in one end of the play

shed. A plot of ground adjoining the old playgrounds has been purchased as a site for the new building. It is to be erected adjoining the present structure, which is about 75 years old and obsolete in design and in poor state of repair. The old building will continue in use until the new structure is ready for occupancy, probably in about four months.

The construction will be financed jointly by the Tenmile school district and the Public Works administration. The district has voted bonds in the sum of \$5,000, while a PWA grant amounting to \$4,500 has been approved.

The new building, which will be of frame construction, will have two classrooms, together with library, two cloak rooms, and heating plants. It will be thoroughly modern in all details. The Tenmile school is attended by 29 pupils. The teachers are K. K. Robinson and Mrs. Virginia Lawrence.
