NEW AND POPULAR BOOKS AVAILABLE AT ROSEBURG PUBLIC LIBRARY

Among the new and popular books now available readers at the Roseburg Public Library include the following fiction books:

Old Haven by David Cornwell DeJong. The story of a willful generation of modern youth in an ancient setting; an old village behind dikes on the North Sea depicted with the rich, mellow detail of a Dutch painting. In racy modern style, DeJong tells the story of Tjerk Mellem, who broke the family tradition and turned to a new life in America.

The Joyful Belongings by Hugh Walpole. A robust, romanticist tells of a gay, irresponsible family who dared to laugh in the face of adversity; the vigorous story of old love and young, and an ancient home about to die.

Derelicts by William McFee. A powerful novel of the sea and adventure in the tropics.

Dr. Norton's Wife by Mildred Walker. Dr. Norton is a much loved junior staff member in the medical school of a large university. His wife, Sue, is slowly dying of an incurable disease and her attractive sister, Jean, manages the household. The book is mainly psychological, recording the mental reactions of the three, especially Sue, to the gradually developing triangle situation. A tragedy at the hospital clarifies the situation by making the doctor realize that it is Sue, not Jean, to whom he turns for understanding and no one can take her place while she lives.

Chay Acres by Pauline Benedict Fischer. A powerful presentation of a Michigan pioneer family during two generations.

Non-fiction:

Across the Frontiers by Sir Philip Gibbs. The author observes and discusses informally European conditions and politics of today.

Andrew Jackson by Margala J. Jackson. A brilliant, yet critical, where is the finest biography of Andrew Jackson ever written. 1938 Pulitzer prize winner.

Big Four by Oscar Lewis. The first one-volume story of Huntington, Stanford, Crocker, and Hopkins, the four men who built the original transcontinental railroad from California to the Pacific, and the story of the railroad.
