JUVENILE GRANGE MEETS SATURDAY

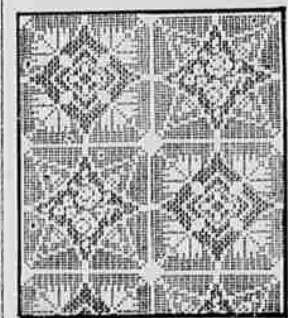

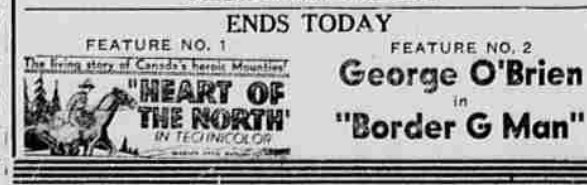
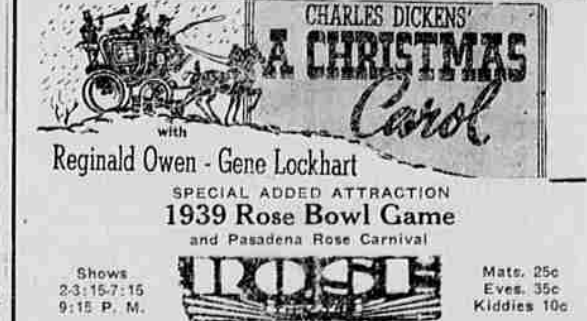
W. C. T. U. MEETING POSTPONED UNTIL JANUARY 17TH
