

SPRAINED ANKLES HIT RHS HOOPSTERS

Indians Expected, However,
to Be in Good Shape to
Battle Marshfield.

An epidemic of sprained ankles suffered in heavy scrimmages sessions are leaving Coach Jim Watts' undefeated Indian players in a crippled condition on the eve of their third conference engagement set for tomorrow night on the senior high court against the lanky Marshfield high school quintet.

First to be stricken down with a twisted ankle was Earl Ward, sophomore forward and leading scorer in the district hoop race, obtained in a pileup during Monday night's practice. Ward is limping around somewhat, favoring the swollen joint, but is expected to be ready to start in the Indian-Pirate contest.

Phil Laurence and Jack Parrott were the casualties in last night's workout, the final heavy practice before the game. Parrott, Indian-rubber-legged center, a potent factor in Coach Watts' scheme of things with his deadly southpaw shooting and his uncanny ability to control backboard rebounds, hopped out of melee under the basket with a twisted ankle. Watts sent Parrott to the showers immediately, with explicit directions to get the ankle in shape. Examination after practice revealed only a minor sprain so it is not believed that the injury will particularly impair his stellar work exhibited all season.

Workout Eased
The local mentor had no more than taken care of Parrott when Laurence lay down the sidelines holding an ankle, re-injuring a weak ankle twisted during the football season. Watts was beginning to get "sore hairs" by this time, so decided that the best thing to do was to ease off stiffness of the workout.

All the injured athletes are expected to be ready to go against the Buccaneers and should be able to give a good account of themselves providing the twisted-ankle flax doesn't strike them down during the game.

The return to the fold of George Sanders, Watts' only letterman regular, was the only cheerful bit of news released this week. Sanders is showing plenty of fire in his workouts which indicates that he is completely recovered from his

PELLMAN, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Portland Webfoot point makers tore in to Washington State college 57 to 31 last night to win the annual series three games to one and maintain the hot pace for the northern division basketball championship.

The Webfoots, defending champions, built up a 31-to-17 lead at the end of the half and pushed it to a 39-point margin in the second half before the Cougars could find the basket with any degree of consistency.

The leadly fire from the floor was led by Oregon's Slim Wintermute, Laddie Gale, scoring titlist, and John Dick. When the Cougars appeared hopelessly beaten, Coach Holston turned over the job to the Oregon reserves.

Washington State went without a point for ten minutes in the second half while the Oregonians ran the score to 47 to 17.

HIBBARD HIGHLY RATED AS SCRAPPER

Headliner on Legion Card
Here Boasts Impressive
Record in Ring.

Logger Jack Hibbard, Klamath Falls, who meets Buddy Peterson of Salem, claimant of the Northwest middleweight boxing championship, in a 16-round main event in Roseburg, Jan. 26, has been boxing for the last seven and a half years. The forthcoming card will be the first presented in Roseburg for more than three years.

Hibbard, although 23 years of age, is a ring veteran and is rated among the best of the Pacific coast middleweights.
He holds two draws with Al Hostak, former middleweight champion of the world. He lost to Hostak by a knockout in a third meeting, after he had suffered a severe head cut. He has boxed Freddie Steele and he beat Sammy McLachlin, brother of Jimmy's, beat Leonard Bennett, who broke Freddie Steele's jaw, and has defeated such boys as Eddie Volk, Ernie Cavalli, Johnny Higgins and others.

He was born in Emmett, Idaho, and has done most of his boxing in the Pacific Northwest. He has headlined shows in Seattle, Vancouver, Portland, Spokane, Boise, Oakland and San Francisco.

Fighter From Boyhood
Hibbard gets his name of Logger Jack from working in the logging woods. He is rated one of the best timber-men in the Northwest. He started boxing before he was 11 years of age. For several years he had to falsify his age in order to secure fights.

Hibbard is a short, stocky-built fighter. He is very quick and is a brilliant fighter with a dangerous left hook and a fair right hand upper cut. He is very aggressive and can absorb plenty of punishment.

His opponent is a younger man both in age and ring experience but has the advantage of being a harder puncher than Hibbard. Peterson has had a sensational rise in boxing circles in the brief two-year period he has been fighting.

Hibbard and Peterson will furnish the main event for the first of what is expected to be a series of boxing cards under sponsorship of Umpqua post of the American Legion. In the event game receipts at the forthcoming fight are sufficient to justify future matches. It is the plan of the Legion post to sponsor future cards at regular intervals.

CHINESE MORALE HIGH, ENVOY SAYS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Nelson T. Johnson, American ambassador to China, told reporters today before conferring with President Roosevelt:

"The Sino-Japanese war has proved beyond a doubt that bombing from the air does not win a war."

The envoy, who has spent half his life in the Orient, reiterated his prediction that the conflict would continue for a long time.
"I found the Chinese morale high," he said, "they were full of hope in the future. I did not find them necessarily discouraged."
"China has not been utterly devastated by the war by any means. Life in the cities re-begins immediately after a bombardment ceases. An attempt is made at once to clear damaged areas."
Johnson called back to Washington for report and consultation, was reliably believed to have made this the substance of a conference yesterday with Secretary Hull.

GALENTA TAKES ON BRESICA TONIGHT

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 19.—(AP)—The amazing Tony Galeto will waddle into the Newark armory ring tonight and in three or four rounds beat out Joe Bresica, an amiable Argentine who once won fame by smacking Joseph Louis on the chops.

Bresica, who will weigh 219 to Tony's 235, or thereabouts, for the forthcoming bout, has the sporting chance of a steer in the stock yards. Galeto has been named the No. 1 challenger for Louis' heavyweight title by the National Boxing association and to date he has fought no one who might endanger that rating.

Tonight's bout will be the last in the minor leagues for some time for the beer keg that walks like a man. The 29th Century Sporting club has signed Galeto and Tommy (still trying) Farr for a 15-round duel at Madison Square garden, March 10.

PAYMENT OF AWARD TO INDIANS URGED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Congressman Walter M. Pierce yesterday asked congress to instruct the Indian bureau to distribute about \$5,000,000 in tribal lands among the Klamath Indians of Oregon.
He said the money had been awarded the tribe by the court of claims in payment of similar taken from tribal lands by whites in violation of a treaty.
The disbursement, he added, would amount to about \$3,000 for each man, woman and child on the Klamath reservation.
**DRUNKENNESS IN
PACE WITH BUSINESS**
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 18.—(AP)—That it takes money to

get drunk is no world-shaking revelation, but whether as fact or theory, the statement is born out by Klamath Falls police records, a survey showed today.
Virtually paralleling the downward trends of business conditions, arrests for drunkenness here fell off from 875 in 1936 to a low of 271 in 1937, then climbed to a 1937 peak of 2845.
The subsequent economic recession, with its accompanying shortage of loose change among the city's confirmed toppers, saw drunk charges in 1938 decline to 1441, corresponding fluctuation was noted in drunken driving cases.

SHOOT TRAPPED 45 DAYS IS RESCUED

ELLISFORD, Wash., Jan. 19.—(AP)—Starved squeals from a skeleton-like pig resulted in its rescue from a narrow pit in which he had lain for 45 days without food or water.

A month and a half ago, O. P. McCoy missed the five-month-old shoot.
The crazed shoot first tried to cut its rescuers and later accepted small quantities of milk at frequent intervals. Today it was regarded as a ghost among its plumper relatives.

TOT SEEKING DEAD PAL WRITES TO GOD

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Jan. 19.—(AP)—At the postoffice here last night a postal inspector opened a letter addressed:
"To God. In Heaven. Up in the sky."

Written in a childish hand, the letter read: "Dear God: When I go upstairs, please let me see Floydie, Bobby."

Summed up it dealt with the devotion of one little "pal" for another.
Floyd, 4, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ferdinand Higstrom, Minneapolis. He died a week ago, Bobby, 5, his companion, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Nell Lewis, neighbors of the Higstroms. Floyd begged that his crossed eyes be cured so other children would not tease him. An operation was arranged but the boy died, health department records show, under the anesthesia, possibly a result of cardiac difficulties.

A pastor and his parents explained to Bobby that Floyd was "going to see God" and Bobby wrote and mailed the letter.

ATTEMPT TO BURN NEW TOWN CHARGED

KLAMATH FALLS, Jan. 19.—(AP)—James McNaughton, 41, was arraigned today on a charge of attempted arson at Gilchrist, mushrooming lumber town in northern Klamath county. McNaughton waived preliminary hearing. He indicated he would also waive grand jury indictment but said he would plead innocent.
F. H. Switzer, Gilchrist construction engineer, signed the complaint against McNaughton. He said gasoline-saturated papers had been placed under two buildings, that McNaughton was surprised in the act of attempting to light the papers.
McNaughton said he knew of a plot to burn the buildings and was merely investigating at the time he was apprehended.
