EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 19.—(Special)—Scouters from the entire Wallamet council area, including those from Lane, Benton, Coos and Douglas counties, will gather in Eugene Friday, January 27, for the ninth annual meeting and dinner. It was announced here today by Alton F. Baker, council president.

Feature of the meeting will be an inspirational address, "The Conquest of the Arctic," by Dr. L. Wirt, whose work took him into northern Alaska even before the gold rush days. Dr. Wirt was at Nome when the city suddenly

sprang up in 1898, and he established the farthest north church, hospital and school. His work has taken him to Mexico, Australia and other points and during the 30 years of his career he has experienced many thrilling adventures. Dr. Wirt is the father of Rev. William Wirt, pastor of the Congregational church in Eugene and scoutmaster of troop six. Much of Dr. Wirt's work has been with young people, and since he is also an able orator, his address is expected to be one of the finest features ever offered on the scouting program in this area.

COUNTY SENIOR DAY HELD IN ROSEBURG

Eleven Schools of Douglas Represented, Educators Give Talks.

The second annual Douglas county senior day, held at the Roseburg senior high school building, was acclaimed a grand success as it came to a close at 3 p. m. Wednesday after a full day of conferences, discussion and "get-acquainted" sessions. The program was under the sponsorship of the high school contacts committee. There were 241 seniors present, and the following schools from outside of Roseburg were represented: Lookingglass, Gardiner, Camas Valley, Drain, Elkton, Reedsport, Sutherlin, Wilbur, Yoncalla and Gifford. Speakers for the day included: Dr. D. B. Poling, representative of all schools; E. B. Lemon, registrar of Oregon State college; E. M. Pallett, registrar of University of Oregon; and Walter Redford, president of Southern Oregon Normal school.
