ROSEBURG PUBLIC LIBRARY OPENS EVANS' ROOM FOR THREE DAYS A WEEK

The Evans' room, at the Roseburg Public Library, will be open again Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of every week, according to an announcement made this week by the librarians. Lloyd Burgess, of Meirone, will be the desk attendant in the Evans' room.

Of interest this week was the surprise experienced by the librarians Monday, when a book, which had been out for nine years, was returned to the library and just three hours later, a book, missing from the shelves for the past ten years, was returned to the library.

Up-to-the-minute books listed for readers this week include: "Song of the Years—Beas Street—Aldrich. With all the human understanding which characterized "A Lantern in her Hand" and "Spring Came on Forever." Beas Street—Aldrich has written a memorable novel of pioneer Iowa. Disputed Passages by Lloyd Burgess. The story of a doctor's conflict between duty and desire—duty to science and a desire for a happy normal life.

"I'm a Stranger Here Myself—Ogden Nash. His light verse makes joyous reading. His philosophy cracks down on the middle of the month and Mondays, on ants and centipedes, haircuts, Mother's Day, Columbus and the common cold. He is a story-teller in verse and a commentator on the human heart. The Best Plays 1937-38 edited by Burns Mantle are indispensable to every theatre lover. This volume contains excerpts and summary of ten outstanding plays.

Our Promised Land—Richard E. Neuberger, is the work of a young reporter, just turned twenty-five, on the staff of the Oregonian. He tells from the ground up, of life and hopes in his own part of the country, the great northwest. His book is grand.

Millions on Wheels by Dewey H. Palmer and Laurence E. Crooks. How to buy, drive and save money on your automobile.

Sky Roaming above two Continents by Harry A. Frank. The author tells what he saw as he traveled by airplane, auto and horseback in Mexico, Central America and the Caribbean.

That's My Story—Douglas Corrigan. He sells newspapers, breaks a leg, and wants to be a locomotive engineer because it is such a dirty job. He helps his mother around the house; gets a dime from Douglas Fairbanks, which he hoistfully keeps. He passes up breakfast on flying gasoline in his old car. He passes up lunch to save money for flying lessons. Honestly and simply Douglas Corrigan tells his story.

On My Own by Mary Knight. For five years Miss Knight was a working reporter in Paris, China, Japan and the United States, and during these years she covered a procession of people and events which seldom pass to the lot of any journalist. Anyone who enjoys an adventure story will revel in this.

Knights of the Range by Zane Grey. The story of a bewildered girl who is pitched into leadership of a great cattle empire, and the man who saves her from ruin at the hands of cattle thieves.
