ROSEBURG EDITOR HEADS PRESS GROUP

EUGENE, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Oregon newspaper publishers, concluding their winter conference here Saturday, elected Harris Ellsworth, editor of the Roseburg News-Review, president in succession to Hugh Ball, of the Hood River News.

The publishers listened to a series of addresses headlined by N. J. L. Pieper, of the federal bureau of investigation at San Francisco, and H. C. Bersten, manager of the Pacific coast advertising bureau of the American Newspaper Publishers' association.

Pieper said records proved that the growth of public enemies was laid in small towns rather than in big city slums and he attributed this to the impression created among small city boys that criminals were heroes.

Bersten, calling newspaper advertising the medium by which the merchant could obtain the highest possible coverage at the lowest unit of expense, described the daily press as having a greater buying influence over people than any other type of publication.
