KELTY TO RETIRE FROM OREGONIAN
 PORTLAND, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Paul R. Kelty, 66, a newspaper man for 42 years, announced today he would retire next Tuesday as editor of the Portland Oregonian, pioneer morning newspaper.
 Kelty entered the profession in 1896 as a cub reporter for the old Portland Telegram, then controlled by Oregonian interests. He became telegraph editor, then city editor and in 1905 accepted the Los Angeles Examiner's offer to become city editor.
 He returned to the Oregonian in 1908 as news editor, continuing in that position until 1924 when he and his son, Eugene S. Kelty, purchased the Eugene, Ore., Guard.
 After selling the Guard he was associated for a time with the Eugene Register but returned to the Oregonian as editorial writer in 1930. He was advanced to editor August 1, 1931.
 Kelty, a native of Oregon, is a member of the national republican program committee. His home is Lafayette, about 30 miles south of here.


