NEW AND THRILLING BOOKS AVAILABLE AT ROSEBURG PUBLIC LIBRARY

New and thrilling books available to book lovers at the Roseburg Public Library this week include the following:

"A Puritan in Babylon," the story of Calvin Coolidge, by William Allen White throws a new light upon the inside of the White House and upon the president in those gorgeous years from 1921 when Coolidge came to Washington as vice-president until 1929 when he left Washington and public life.

"An Illustrated Handbook of Art History," by Frank J. Ross, Jr., is an unusual book containing over two thousand illustrations which cover western art from the prehistoric period to the present, including Egyptian, Mesopotamian, early Aegean, Greek, Roman, early Christian and Byzantine, Romanesque, Gothic, Flemish, Spanish, French, American and modern art.

"Days in Old Spain," by Gertrude Ross gives us a memorable picture of the pre-war Spain which has been shattered for our lifetime. Lady Ross recaptures much, in her charming sympathetic record, of leisurely days spent in a wide area of old Spain, especially in the lesser known west and north. The book is illustrated by her husband.

"Major League Baseball," by Eban Allen is a complete manual of baseball for both players and lookers-on. It will become the authority on baseball for today's generation of ball players and those to come.

"Latin America," by F. A. Kirkpatrick is a one volume history of Latin America, its discovery and conquest, the Spanish and Portuguese empires, and the gradual winning of the independence by the separate states. The whole story is here given concisely but, fully, the first part dealing with the period from the discovery to the coming of independence, and the second describing in detail the individual states of today.

"Romance of American Transportation," by Franklin M. Reek, comes next Robert Fulton and his steamboat, the Clermont, now often called "Fulton's Folly" by his mocking acquaintances; De Witt Clinton and his plans for the big ditch, the Erie canal; Henry Ford and the first home built "tin lizzy." The thrilling true story of man's conquering of space and time in transportation is in the stories of those men, and many other men who contributed to most in our country's history and her expansion.
