Late books just received this week at the Roseburg Public Library include the following: "Man Who Killed Lincoln" by Philip Van Doren. The story of Lincoln's death contains all the elements of drama and the men involved in it were as strange a group of characters as were ever assembled in history's stage. The story of the chief conspirator, John Wilkes Booth, is a tale of a night of terror during which a whole nation was paralyzed; of the greatest man hunt in history. And it is a story as exciting as any adventure yarn and as blood curdling as any murder mystery.

Vagabond Voyaging by Larry Nixon is one of the most tantalizing travel books ever written. It not only makes you want to start off for the other side of the world, but makes it look as if there were no reason why you shouldn't.

Inside Red China by Nym Wales. For over four months, from May to September, 1937, Nym Wales lived in Yen-an, the Soviet capital. There she came to know personally nearly all the leaders of the Chinese revolution. She saw the Chinese communists themselves lived; she shared their shelter, their food, their lives. Written with a wealth of humor and incident, this is a great story, and an amazing piece of journalism.

Rats in the Larder by Joachim Joachim. Exploding the popular conception of a Utopian Scandinavia. The author shows how the Nazis have already attained economic and military dominance in peaceful little Denmark.
