Foreign markets have ruled firm through the week, although Sydney was a bit soft at the weekend. European markets are very firm. In the west comparatively little has been done, growers inclining still to hold their wools above eastern parity. Manufacturers are very busy on old contracts but find new business sluggish. Mohair is quiet but steady. Some adult has been sold in Texas at 38-38 1/2 cents."
