James Gang's "Waterloo" in Raid On Minnesota Bank Referred to in Diary Held by Camas Valley Folk

Extracts from the personal diary of D. E. Goodman (deceased), father of Mrs. R. L. Richter and grandfather of Mrs. W. W. White, both residents of Camas Valley, are of particular interest this week in connection with the motion picture "Jesse James," starting Wednesday at Hunt's Indian theater.

Mr. Goodman, who for many years was a resident of Fairbault, Minn., near the scene of the disastrous Northfield raid of the James boys and their gang. His diary contains daily items covering a period of more than 45 years.

The Camas Valley women, recalling incidents concerning the Northfield incidents, copied the following from the diary:

September 7
At work at Shattuck setting range. Heard of sad affair in Northfield. Eight men rode into town and shot two men in bank. Got \$1,000. Two of them got shot. Big excitement in Fairbault.

September 12
Heard they got horses at those robbers.

September 16
Heard that wounded robber was caught today.

September 21
Three of the robbers captured. One killed. They have had a hot time of it the last two weeks. Hundreds of men after them all the time.

September 24
Robbers are now in jail awaiting trial.

September 26
I went up to see the robbers. They are not such hard looking chaps as I supposed they were. Cole Younger is rather a stout built man—bald headed, rather good looking. Was shot under jaw and bullet lodged near right eye. He looks bad. Robert Younger is a fine looking young man, rather tall and well built, with a dark mustache. Wounded in arm at Northfield. Cole Carter is in a bad condition and not able to sit up—part of his jaw shot away. Three robbers killed, three in jail, two yet free.

Big excitement in town tonight. Got a lot of arms from St. Paul and a company of men have volunteered to defend the jail from any party who may try to get the prisoners out.

October 6
Peaky (local photographer) is making 900 pictures daily of those robbers.

October 16
Reported that one of the James boys captured in Missouri.

November 20
They were tried today and pleaded guilty. Sentenced to state prison for life with hard labor. They went away this morning. Guess we are through with them now. Has cost the state and county a pretty figure to keep them this long.

LOGGING OPERATORS BUY O. & C. TIMBER

PORTLAND, Ore., March 1.—Sale of 31,036,000 board feet of timber on Oregon and California revested lands located in six western Oregon counties was reported Tuesday by W. H. Horning, chief forester of the Oregon and California revested land administration.

The timber was sold to 16 different operators, who will log it and pay the government \$73,566. Of this amount 75 per cent, or \$55,174.50, will be paid by the United States treasury to the 18 counties in which Oregon and California lands are located on a pro rata basis.

Timber involved in Tuesday's sale was scattered in the following counties: Coos, Douglas, Josephine, Klamath, Lane and Washington.

Since March 1, 1938, Mr. Horning said, approximately 250,000,000 board feet of Oregon and California timber has been sold for about \$200,000,000.

The Oregon and California lands comprise 2,500,000 acres of forest managed on a sustained yield basis to insure a permanent supply of timber.

SEES U. S. TREADING PATH OF SOCIALISM

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The United States, in the opinion of Editor Merle Thorpe of Nation's Business, "has gone three-quarters of the way toward being a socialist state."

Here on a visit to the Pacific coast, Thorpe charged 41 federal agencies are in direct competition with banks and insurance companies, and the government has obtained control through regulation of the country's communications, transportation and natural resources.

"There is now going on a great struggle between the state and individual enterprise for control, and it is my opinion that unless the people rouse themselves the state will win," he declared.

He called free flowing capital the reason for the nation's business development during the first 30 years of the century, but said in the past eight years—"which has been a reign of terror for business"—less than one-tenth the flow of capital has gone into new development.

"The money which would ordinarily be used for new things has been taken by tax collectors and expended by political agencies; thus it is only overhead and does nothing to create jobs by expansion and development."

The first Oregon statute was drafted by W. B. Dennis of Carlton and Loyal M. Graham of Forest Grove. Among other sponsors were C. C. Chapman of Portland and James S. Stewart, of Fossil. It created little attention then, but today it is one of the most important sources of revenue, the motor association pointed out.

The federal government tapped the gas pumps in 1933, and now Oregon's tax, now 5 cents, has provided about \$94,087,000 in its 20 years of existence. Last year its income from gasoline sales amounted to \$11,298,218.

FACTS FOR THOSE DRIVING IN FOGS

Anyone who has done much driving in fog knows the feeling of helplessness which overcomes one when the thick cottony blanket settles down in dead earnest, and one has many miles to drive.

Here are a few facts to remember about fog:

Two-thirds of the normal year's fog occurs during the months of October, November and December, with November being the worst month of the year. Fog is usually much heavier at night than in the daytime. Ordinarily it occurs on several consecutive days so that the driver in most cases should be expecting it.

The driver's first reaction to fog should be to reduce his speed so that he will be able to stop within the assured clear distance ahead. In the daytime, he should have his headlights turned on in the "parking" position, to make his car more readily visible to other drivers.

At night, he should drive with his headlights dimmed or depressed, in order that the roadway immediately ahead of the car will be lighted. If the lights are left in ordinary driving position, the rays will simply be thrown back into the driver's eyes, as the fog is composed of tiny drops of water which act like reflecting mirrors.

Many drivers like to use yellow or amber auxiliary driving lights during fog. Ordinarily these lights should be adjusted rather low so that they sweep the surface of the highway, since their purpose is to illuminate some surface or object by which the driver can guide his vehicle.

TROLLEY CAR SMASH KILLS SIX PERSONS

BOSTON, March 1.—(AP)—A broken brake part which "never occurred before" today was blamed by Boston Elevated company officials as the cause of the trolley smashup which killed six persons and injured nearly two score yesterday, in this city's worst street car accident since 1916.

Making its tenth trip of the day, the trolley car suddenly went out of control on an incline in the Dorchester section near the Franklin park zoo, failed to negotiate a turn, hurtled across a broad intersection and careened into a tree.

Six persons standing in the vestibule of the car were killed instantly, four of them crushed beneath the car, one of them between the car and the tree. All were residents of Greater Boston.

Edward F. Hanely, 57, the operator, who has been in the company service for 22 years, was released in \$2,000 bail after being booked on a technical manslaughter charge.
