OUTLOOK FOR WOOL MORE FAVORABLE

PORTLAND, March 13.—(AP)—The federal bureau of agricultural economics reported the wool outlook was more favorable than a year ago.

The carry over from 1938 will be considerably less than 1937. Consumption was expected to increase. The total wool production in the United States last year was estimated at 436,515,900 pounds compared with 432,809,000 in 1937. About 46,726,000 head of sheep produced an average fleece of 7.98 pounds. The above wool value last year reached \$71,378,000, considerably less than the preceding year. About 1,932,000 Oregon sheep produced 17,499,000 pounds of wool last year compared with a production of 12,501,000 pounds by 2,035,000 sheep the previous year. The 1938 value was \$3,325,000 against \$5,600,000 in 1937.

SYNTHETIC WOOL FROM CASEIN TRIED

NEW YORK, March 13.—(AP)—National Dairy Products Corp. was disclosed today to be experimenting with the manufacture of synthetic wool from casein, a product of skimmed milk. The company has equipped a small laboratory at Bristol, R. I., where the experiments are going forward, but no announcement has been made as yet concerning the progress.

At the present time, only 12 billion pounds of the 50 billion pounds of skimmed milk produced annually in the United States are utilized commercially and scientists have been seeking new outlets for this milk.

NEW POPE CROWNED, RECEIVES 41 ENVOYS

VATICAN CITY, March 13.—(AP)—Pope Pius XII opened his old summer estate in the Alban Hills today to the envoys of 41 nations who saw him crowned with brilliant pomp and stately ceremony in St. Peter's yesterday.

Joseph P. Kennedy, United States ambassador to London and the first official United States representative to attend a papal coronation since 1840, had a separate audience to present Mrs. Kennedy and eight of their children.

Diplomats, prelates and princes were among the 500,000 or so persons who watched the resplendent scenes of religious pagantry and enthusiasm in the vast mother church of Catholicism when the great, golden, jewel-encrusted tiara was placed on the head of the 262nd pope, a pope of peace.

WASH TUBBS

LOST EXPLORER RETURNS AFTER 16 YEARS. UNDAUNTED BY CANNIBALS, YET FEARS TO CROSS FIFTH AVENUE. New York, March 9.—Given up for dead by his family 16 years ago, G. Washington Tubbs, 50, arrived from Africa yesterday to find that his family, including an only son, had died during his absence. At the Palace View Hotel, Tubbs told a tale stranger than fiction. While exploring an unknown region of the Belgian Congo, he encountered a tribe of pygmy cannibals, each wearing a heavy necklace of pure gold. Hoping to learn where the gold came from, Tubbs attempted to make friends with them. He credited too well, he said, for he was mistaken for a white god and kept virtually a prisoner for 16 years. The region, Tubbs believes, contains the richest mineral deposit in the world. Heartbroken upon learning that his son, G.
