NAZI THREATEN DUTY RETALIATION

BERLIN, March 21.—(AP)—A yelled threat Germany might retaliate against the United States treasury's imposition of a 25 per cent countervailing duty on most German products was made today by Boerszeitung, one of Germany's leading financial organs. "That we in Germany shall now reflect as to whether and what counter measures are due to us—about this nobody should entertain the slightest doubts even for one moment," the newspaper said. Boerszeitung asserted, however, farmers of the American middle west would solve Germany's trade problem without her having to resort to counter measures because the farmers "not only want to but must export."

CAR KILLS ANOTHER AGED PORTLANDER

PORTLAND, March 21.—(AP)—Portland recorded its 17th traffic fatality of the year early today when an automobile struck and killed Joseph W. Pearl, 72, as he attempted to cross Barbour boulevard. Ninety per cent of the victims have been pedestrians more than 60 years old.

IRISH RACE MONEY GOES TO AMERICANS

DUBLIN, March 21.—(AP)—Americans drew 24 of 50 residual prizes worth \$1,210 each today in the second day's drawing of the Irish hospitals' sweepstakes on Friday's grand national steeplechase at Aintree. Of 700 consolation prizes of \$500 each drawn before the morning races, 375 went to Americans. Yesterday 278 United States ticket-holders got chances to win prizes of as much as \$150,000 by drawing horses scheduled to run in the race. A total of \$12,141,735 was received by sale of sweepstakes tickets at \$2.50 each, and the prize fund, after deduction for expenses, taxes, ticket sellers' prizes, and \$2,232,280 for hospital trust, amounted to \$6,710,500.

SALMON FISHERMEN ASK PRICE BOOST

ASTORIA, March 21.—(AP)—A one-cent price increase for salmon caught from the start of the commercial season to August 1 was asked yesterday by Columbia river fishermen. The fishermen voted to request 13c a pound for spring salmon. The price last year was 12c. The meeting, attended by gill-netters, cannery workers, launch captains, deckhands and fish receivers, also agreed to ask one-cent increases in fish caught from Aug. 1 to Aug. 10, and from the latter date until the end of the season. Last year eight cents was paid during the earlier period and six cents later.
