NEW BOOKS RECEIVED AT ROSEBURG PUBLIC LIBRARY DURING THE PAST WEEK

New books received this past week at the Roseburg Public Library include the following:

Wilderness Wife by Katherine Pinkerton. Faced with the necessity of an outdoor life, with no resources, but with some writing ability, a young couple made a home in the Canadian wilderness in Northern Ontario and supported themselves for five years. A log cabin was built with their own hands, supplies were transported by canoe, and Mrs. Pinkerton developed an unexpected skill in cooking, trapping, gardening and driving a dog team. The last book, was a real individual. The author writes of his pioneering with delightful humor and an unaffected satisfaction at their achievements.

Beautiful Hawaii by J. Walker McSpadden "The land of the Lotus eaters" is a frequently called, McSpadden, a traveler with a discerning eye and unbounding enthusiasm, found Hawaii a beautiful place. He describes in detail each of the islands that go to make up the group. The travel folders, steamship lines, and tourist agencies emphasize hula girls, ukuleles, moonlit beaches and fragrant leis, but Mr. McSpadden tells you about the "mums," tells you what to avoid, and is particularly apt in regarding the "phony" from the real. Beautiful Hawaii is more than an ordinary guide book. It is filled with wit and common sense as well as information.

When There Is No Peace by Hamilton Fish Armstrong. A pertinent review of events in Europe since February 1938, with suggestions of the possible consequences. He refrains from drawing too many conclusions, and allows his chronicle of the diplomatic exchanges and public reactions of the past year to tell its own story.

The Adolescent by Ada Hart Arlett. This book is written for parents whose children are over twelve years old, but not yet twenty-one. The period of adolescence presents more problems to the modern parent than any other period. During the pre-adolescent age the child is largely under the influence of his parents, but as he grows older he comes more and more under the influence of the "gangs" and of the community. In addition, the child is undergoing tremendous physiological changes that set him at odds with his companions, his parents, and himself, and parental guidance is most difficult when the child most needs it.

How To Be Your Own Decorator by Helen Kones. Here for the first time is a complete course in home decoration by the best known authority on that subject, Helen Kones, is the director of Good Housekeeping Studio. This book will show you how to transform an unfurnished house or your present home, into an attractive place in

With intensity and passion Mrs. Norris approaches the story of young Rebecca Gibson who rejected a ready-made love for life with a man she hardly knew.
